

Pribiloff Natives Going Modern In Dress, Luxuries

SEATTLE—Natives of Uncle Sam's distant Pribiloff Islands, prosperous after a good seal season, are swinging in a big way to American styles and entertainment—from high-heeled slippers to radios.

When the good ship Penguin points her nose northward for the last trip of the season, a goodly portion of the cargo will be mail order good for the natives.

"They go strong for all the feminine articles of apparel that their white sisters down here do," commented Edward C. Johnston, superintendent of the fur seal division of the U. S. fish and wildlife service.

"They go for the highest heeled shoes, silk stockings and the other styles to be found in the well known catalogs, which are known as 'the Alaskan Bible.'"

"Musical instruments and radios also are in great demand, and no native house is complete without one to three radios and as many phonographs."

The Penguin docked here with 27,000 fur seal pelts, bringing the total season's take in the Pribiloffs to 95,000 bachelor seals, Johnston said, compared with 70,000 last year. The pelts go to the auction block in St. Louis. The price last year was around \$27.50 per pelt.

Under International treaty, the United States gets 70 per cent of the pelts, Japan 15 per cent and Canada 15 per cent. The natives do the killing under government agent supervision and receive 60 or 75 cents for each.

Johnston said the natives live under conditions better than that of the average workman in the United States. They have concrete houses, with electric lights.

Phoebe Hawthorne, a graduate of Linfield, will have classes in English and Spanish at the senior high, and also direct the glee clubs in that school. Miss Hawthorne has been teaching in the high school at Drain.

Alva Laws, who has had several years teaching experience in Jackson and Josephine counties, will have charge of the twelfth grade social science courses in the senior high school. This work was formerly assigned to James Davis, who will have charge of physical education for boys in the senior and junior high schools and head coach for the athletic teams. Mr. Laws is a graduate of Albany college.

Marian Murphy, a graduate of Oregon State college, has been employed for the girls' physical education classes in the two high schools.

Phyllis Ricketts will be the instructor in the high school typing department. Miss Ricketts is a graduate of University of Oregon.

Claire Shanks will have the ninth grade English and junior high library. Alice Gerot, who had this work last year, has been assigned to the senior high. Miss Shanks is a graduate of University of Oregon and has been teaching in the high school at Sweet Home.

Bonita Skilling, a graduate of Oregon College of Education, will have the second and third grade rooms at Fullerton. For the past six years she has been teaching in Junction City.

Enrollment in the schools will probably show an increase again this year, Mr. Campbell states. In addition to the normal increase, the Wilbur union high school will send their students to Roseburg. The Smick school district will also close their school and transport the children from that district to Roseburg.

Shah of Iran Appeals For Cessation of War

continued, "have thrown bombs at the city of Ahwaz (in the heart of the oil fields about 75 miles northeast of Bandar Shahpur).

"Wherever the transgressing armies encountered the Iranian army, there naturally were clashes and fighting."

The major Iranian force was stationed, as the attack came, in the districts around Ahwaz to defend one of the world's richest oil fields which the British operate. (The British now claim to be in complete control of these fields after some fighting.)

Germans in Jam

Germans in Iran appeared gravely anxious lest their evacuation of Iran through Turkey be prevented. Scores were at the Turkish legation seeking courier visas to travel through Turkey. A German diplomat started Sunday for Turkey, was unable to cross the frontier and returned.

About 800 men, women and children with German passports began collecting today a German summer estate, outside the capital, preparing tents and other facilities for self-made internment.

Neutral eyewitness reports told of Russia bombs shattering adobe buildings of villages around Tabriz, killing civilians. It was believed certain that no such attacks would be directed against Teheran.

(An armistice to be followed by a convention was predicted today in London, with the agreement possibly allowing the shah to retain power and definitely permitting British and Russian forces to police Iran for the duration of the war.)

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Medical Groups Of Oregon Join Defense Program

SALEM, Aug. 27.—(AP)—The state civilian defense council announced today mobilization of the state's medical fraternity into a "medical disaster relief organization," to supervise first aid and relief work in the event of air raids or enemy invasion.

Participating agencies include the Oregon State Medical Society, Oregon State Nurses Association, Oregon Association of Hospitals, and the American Red Cross.

Heads of these organizations were appointed to a state-wide committee which will organize county disaster relief committees. Clyde C. Foley of Portland will be executive secretary of this committee.

State civilian defense coordinator Jerrold Owen asked county defense councils to make surveys of hospital facilities, as well as public buildings which would be available for emergency hospitals.

Don Black, Salem, president of the Oregon state junior chamber of commerce, was appointed today as state chairman of the speakers bureau of the state defense council by Governor Sprague.

Black will appoint his state-wide committee and will assist county defense councils in organizing county speakers bureaus.

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Tax Returns For Low Income Class To Be Simplified

WASHINGTON, Aug. 27.—(AP)—The senate finance committee approved today a simplified return for income tax payers who earn \$3,000 or less a year.

Committee members said that the new simplified form for small taxpayers was similar to one advocated by Secretary of Treasury Morgenthau and would aid both taxpayers and the treasury in putting into effect the record-breaking \$3,500,000,000 tax bill.

Under the proposal, the taxpayer could go to the postoffice or some other federal office, inform officials about his total income and dependents, and learn quickly the amount of taxes he must pay. Graduated tables giving the amount of tax owed for various amounts of net income would be made widely available.

Morgenthau told senators that the complicated mathematics involved in determining taxes for the millions of small taxpayers might cause disgust unless a simplified procedure were developed.

The committee also approved slight increases in the so-called normal tax rate for all smaller corporations which senators said also would absorb the present 10 per cent defense tax.

These increases would apply to all corporations with a net annual income of \$25,000 or less and committee officials said would increase estimated revenues of the bill by \$3,200,000 a year.

Senators said the new normal income tax rate for corporations with a net income of \$5,000 or less would be a flat 15 per cent.

Higher taxes on wines, cordials, and brandies were approved by the committee.

Senator George (D-Ga.), chairman, said that committee rejected a proposal to increase the federal tax on gasoline to 2 cents a gallon from the 21 cents voted by the house.

The group also approved the house excise tax rates on safety deposit boxes, tires and tubes before recessing until tomorrow.

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Bicycle Makers To Reduce Models, Cut Decorations

WASHINGTON, Aug. 27.—(AP)—The dream of every small boy—a bicycle decked with all kinds of gleaming gadgets—is to become just a mail order catalogue dream.

The office of production management disclosed yesterday that 12 leading bicycle manufacturers had agreed at a meeting with part suppliers, retailers and defense officials to cut the weight of bicycles about 10 per cent, make fewer models, and eliminate unneeded metal decorations, in order to save vital materials for defense production.

Juvenile and racing models probably will be cut out entirely, it was decided, and each manufacturer will produce only 10 models instead of the 20 to 40 now offered. Thus machine tools, skilled workmen and materials will be freed for more urgent work.

A saving of about 20 per cent in the rubber used by the industry is contemplated by the elimination of white sidewall tires, which automobile manufacturers already have agreed to discontinue.

NEW YORK, Aug. 27.—(AP)—Haberdashery shops around New York are preparing new price tags on white shirts, the result of a jump of 25 cents on staple garments announced by the Manhattan Shirt Co., a leading manufacturer.

A spokesman for the Manhattan company said its advance price which will apply in the retail market, was based on increased manufacturing costs and higher raw material charges.
