

Dodgers Keep Top Margin by Victory Over Cincinnati

The desperate hopes of the Cincinnati Reds for a miracle that would return them to a third straight world series have been engulfed in the slow tide that seeps to be carrying the Brooklyn Dodgers on its crest.

They had their best and perhaps last chance to break into the thick of the National league pennant scramble last night and failed, as Higbe whipped Vander Meer 4-2 in a pitching duel.

It was an important triumph for the Dodgers, preserving their game and a half margin over the St. Louis Cardinals, who beat the New York Giants in another night game 8-5.

But it was even more important for the Reds. They had won 16 of their last 20 games in a great late-summer surge and would have moved 7 1/2 games of first place if they had won.

However, their loss dropped them to 9 1/2 behind Brooklyn and 8 back of St. Louis.

The Cardinals had to come from behind to beat the Giants. The Redbirds made three costly errors in the early innings and Young hit his 20th homer with one on. The powerful St. Louis artillery opened up and tallied six runs in the three final frames.

Other Results.

In the other National league games Pittsburgh walloped the Phillies 12-2 with a 21-hit bombardment, including three doubles and two singles by Vaughan, and the Chicago Cubs divided a doubleheader with the Boston Braves. Salvo shut out the Cubs 6-0 on five hits in the opener and then Root pitched 8 2/3 innings in relief to win the second session 6-4 and gain the 200th victory of his 16-year career. Root provided the winning margin for himself

by hitting a single with the bases loaded in the ninth.

The New York Yankees added another game to their immense American league lead by overwhelming the St. Louis Browns 11-1.

The last place Washington Senators crushed the second place Chicago White Sox 11-3 with an 18-hit barrage while Chase pitched seven-hit ball.

Letty Grove pulled a muscle in his side, possibly meaning his loss for the season as the Boston Red Sox dropped a 6-3 verdict to the Detroit Tigers.

Heath drove in seven runs with two homers and a triple as the Cleveland Indians assaulted the Athletics 11-4.

Great Pitching Jobs Turned In By Coast Leaguers

Two young men already ticketed for the major leagues and two others who may soon follow last night gave baseball followers along the Pacific slope displays of pitching skill which must go down in Coast league records as a complete waste of time.

There was plenty of justification ethetically, however, for the effort put forth by Terry and Mungler in San Diego's 3-1 13-inning victory over Sacramento, and by Hollingsworth and Olsen in Sacramento's seven-inning 3-2 return swipe at San Diego.

The evening ended, of course, with Sacramento still six games ahead of the idle Seattle Rainiers and seven in front of the third-place San Diegans.

But the inconclusive result could not detract, to start with, from Terry's brilliance in holding the heavy-hitting Senators to seven singles over the extra-inning route and striking out 11.

Mungler, a hard luck guy who goes to the St. Louis-Cardinals

next spring, performed nearly as well. He fanned 10, and until the 13th, when Pellagrini and Patchett singled and Garibaldi broke up the game with a double, he had allowed only six safe blows.

Hollingsworth came through with a four-hitter to give Sacramento its victory, and Olsen was not far behind with six safeties.

At San Francisco, Seats throttled Los Angeles, 3-0, on six hits. Except for a second-inning lapse, when he was touched for five blows and all the winners' runs, Humphreys was almost as effective against the Seals.

Another six-hit pitching job gave Hollywood an 8-2 decision over Oakland and brought Gay his ninth win of the year against three losses.

Ananiev and Darrow of the Acorns also contrived to produce a six-hitter. There was this difference, however: Darrow, called to "relieve" Ananiev in the seventh, walked three in that inning and three more in the eighth, in which he also hit a batter with a pitched ball. Upshot was that the Stars collected six runs in the two frames on a single hit.

Seattle and Portland, scheduled to meet in the latter city, were rained out, and will attempt to make up the postponement with a doubleheader to night.

Extra Softball Games Probable To Correct Error

The city softball league arrangements were complicated today by demands for a previously unscheduled round of games, which it now is planned to play Friday night, according to an announcement today. Discovery of an error in the second-half schedule was reported, and, as correction of the error would make possible a tie for first place by the Dunham Transfermen, winners of the first half, now in second place, it was believed that an added round would be demanded.

Including the games to be played tonight in accordance with the second-half schedule, each of the four teams will have played each of the other teams of the league three games, except for Dunham's and Boucock's and Texaco and Montgomery Ward, who have met as opponents only twice in the second half.

To complete the schedule with an even number of games for each combination it would be necessary for these teams to meet once more, and it now is planned to play the games Friday night. Games tonight will pair Texaco against Boucock's and Dunham's against Montgomery Ward.

As Boucock's lead Dunham's by one game and both teams are expected to win their contests tonight against the two teams battling for cellar position, the rounding out of the schedule would give the Transfermen an opportunity for a tie for first place, which, in turn, would necessitate a playoff for the second-half championship.

On the other hand, should the

Butchers win the game planned for Friday night, the Transfermen and Boucock's as winners of the first and second divisions of the schedule would then meet for the city championship.

American Flier Downs 2 Nazis, Gets Foot Wound

LONDON, Aug. 28.—(AP)—Pilot Officer William Robert Dunn of the American Eagle squadron, former airline flier from Houston, Tex., shot down two German fighters today and is suffering from a bullet wound in his foot, the air ministry reported.

Dunn's wound was not serious and he was able to bring his plane down safely, it was said. The two victories today brought his total to four.

The air ministry said two Eagle squadrons participated in the day's offensive operations in which ten German fighters were reported destroyed.

Two RAF fliers collided over the French coast, the ministry disclosed. One pilot managed to fly back to his station but the other had to bail out.

Auto Blow Kills Dentist As He Fuels His Own Car

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 27.—(AP)—Dr. Donald Henry Stahl, 32, dentist, struck by another car as he filled his own machine with gasoline shortly after midnight, died today.

Traffic Patrolman Bard Purcell said Dr. Stahl was standing behind his parked machine when both were struck. He was Portland's 27th traffic fatality for 1941.

1/2 lb. raisins

1/2 lb. walnut meats, chopped fine

Cut pears into one-inch cubes, grind on chop line the lemons and oranges (and raisins). Combine pears, lemons and oranges, add sugar, stir slowly for one-half hour, add raisins, add nuts, stir-be over in a Dutch oven, add water, add salt, 4 hours. Cool and put in glasses; does not need to be sealed.
