Gen. Hines Scores Defense Strikes

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 28.—(AP)—The national convention of the Veterans of Foreign Wars was told yesterday by Brigadier General Frank T. Hines, veterans administrator, that strikes on defense projects are "the result of bad advice."

"Even in times of emergency," he said, "I do not believe that any of us want to deprive workmen of what normally would be their rights."

"But they do not have and never have had—in time of national emergency, the right to strike against their government—to interfere with the progress of a program adopted by the congress, or to ignore a request, if not an actual order of the president of the United States."

The veterans, after hearing the Hines address, adopted a resolution urging that jurisdictional strikes be considered unconstitutional and outlawed.

In another address, Brigadier General Lewis B. Hershey, deputy director of selective service, said that "something has to be done" about the high percentage of men rejected by the army for physical defects.

"Either they will have to be inducted into the army regardless of physical condition and rehabilitated there, or the states will have to make some arrangement for doing it," he declared.

In one board, Hershey said, 50 per cent were rejected because of physical impairment.

Export Control Order Expanded by Roosevelt

WASHINGTON, Aug. 28.—(AP)—President Roosevelt signed a proclamation yesterday placing under export control all military equipment, munitions and component parts, machinery, tools or materials, or supplies necessary for their manufacture, serving, or operation, which had not been made subject to such control by previous proclamations.

Acting under the proclamation, the export control administration

issued a schedule prescribing the forms, conversions and derivatives of the additional articles placed under control. These included numerous animal products and vegetable products, textile fibers and manufacturers.

Corn on Cob, Eh What? Briton Explains How

LONDON, Aug. 28.—(AP)—The London newspapers discovered yesterday that an intrepid English farmer is growing 13 acres of sweet corn, which will go on sale for cob eating at 15 cents per ear, and one writer undertook to explain it this way: "Corn is a favorite food in America where it is grown largely in the southern states. It is also regarded as a great delicacy by Anglo-Indians throughout the east."

"The cob is boiled for 15 minutes and served like a potato in its jacket. The leaves are removed, butter or margarine is spread over the corn and it is sprinkled with pepper and salt."

"Then, holding it at the ends, you nibble the corn like a rabbit."

War Orders Placed On "Must" Basis

WASHINGTON, Aug. 28.—(AP)—American industry henceforth must accept all war supply orders for domestic defense needs or anti-axis nations, even though it means a delay or suspension in the production of civilian goods.

In the past a manufacturer was free to accept or refuse such orders, as he saw fit, but the office of production management issued a new regulation yesterday which makes the acceptance of those orders mandatory.

The regulation said that the mandatory acceptance applied not only to the purchases made by the United States army, navy or other government defense agencies, but also to purchases by Great Britain, Belgium, China, Greece, the Netherlands, Norway, Poland, Russia and Yugoslavia. It likewise included government orders for delivery to any nation in the western hemisphere.

Although the official statement

did not state how recalcitrant cases would be dealt with, it was indicated that manufacturers refusing to take such orders would be cut off from the raw material supply which they need for regular civilian production.

Congressman Mott Out for Sixth Term

SALEM, Aug. 28.—(AP)—Rep. James W. Mott, republican who represents the first Oregon district, announced last night that he would seek reelection.

Mott, now serving his fifth term, is acting ranking member of the house naval affairs committee. He has been in Oregon two weeks inspecting defense areas and the Willamette valley flood control project.

He said he would return to Washington in about four weeks.

U. S.-Repaired British Plane Carrier Delivered

ABOARD H. M. S. ILLUSTRIOUS, Aug. 28.—(AP)—Captain Lord Louis Mountbatten, cousin of King George VI of England and one of Great Britain's most distinguished naval officers, formally took command of the repaired aircraft carrier Illustrous this morning in a colorful ceremony aboard the ship's flight deck.

Captain Mountbatten, who has had two ships of his command sunk, succeeds Captain G. Seymour Tuck, D. S. O.

The announcement that the 23,000-ton vessel was in an American shipyard did not disclose the ship's whereabouts.

Last June the British admiralty reported that the ship was

almost destroyed in the attack by axis planes near Sicily and at Malta.

Observers Named for Posts at Glendale

GLENDAL, Ore., Aug. 28.—It has been announced this week that I. H. Smith of Glendale was appointed chief organizer of the aircraft observation posts. There will be four posts in this vicinity, at West Fork, with George Blyberg; at Glendale, with George Morey, the scoutmaster, in charge; at Fortune Branch with Mrs. Viola Hill, and at Azalea with Roland Johns in charge. These people will be assisted by crews they will appoint. The Boy Scouts will help George Morey of Glendale.
