WOOL

BOSTON, Sept. 5.—(AP)—The Commercial Bulletin will say tomorrow: "Simultaneous with the notification of the government that bids would be opened in Philadelphia on Sept. 15 for more than 8 million yards of worsted

and woolen goods, activity in the Boston wool market reached a new high for the past few months as prospective bidders entered the market to cover on the quantities they anticipate bidding on.

"A fairly good movement of domestic and foreign wools of fine quality was reported in some quarters but there was no tendency on the part of dealers to advance asking prices although current quotations took on a firmer tone.

"The prediction that active buying would start immediately after the holiday appears more likely to be a reality now that the government is once more in the market for large quantities of cloth. The early part of the week was marked by considerable looking around by mill buyers and there was a general movement of small lots reported in most quarters. Mills were decidedly interested in wools but they did not consider prices right; consequently they began dickering with dealers and a substantial amount of business was hanging fire as the week came to a close.

"Operations in the west were mostly dull. The only section to report any activity of consequence was the Roswell section of New Mexico. Piece goods markets were not quite as active this week but the trade did not view this letdown with alarm. Heavy buying has been going on in recent weeks and the letdown was natural. The holiday also played a part in slowing up activity, according to some sources.

"Mohair is mostly unchanged this week. Buying has been light in the country."
