Father Joins Seven Sons in U. S. Navy

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 10.—(AP)—Clarence Floyd Patten, 52, today took up his duties as a fireman first class aboard the battleship Nevada, where seven of his eight sons are serving their enlistments.

Patten, a farmer and sawmill operator of Ridgefield, Wash., took the oath in a ceremony which was broadcast on a national radio hookup from the deck of the Nevada at sea and in which Admiral Harold R. Stark, chief of naval operations, joined from Washington.

"Clarence Floyd Patten is a very unusual recruit and an outstanding patriot," Admiral Stark said. "In a very real sense he typifies the American father of today who stands shoulder to shoulder with his sons in the ranks of the defenders of liberty."

"I hold it a rare privilege to congratulate Clarence Floyd Patten and his seven patriotic sons. You are the kind of men we want in the navy."

The navy department waived the age limit of 50 years to permit Patten to join his sons, Gilbert, 30, water tender first class; Marvin, 27, Clarence, 25, Allen, 24, and Myrne, 22, fireman second class; Ray, 20, fireman second class; and Bruce, 18, fireman second class.

Myrne is being paid off today to take a railroad job, but a younger brother, Wayne, 16, plans to take his place by enlisting on his next birthday.

The family home was originally in Lake City, Ia., and later in Odebolt, Ia. The mother died in 1927. A sister, Mrs. Martha Sporleder, 31, mother of four, lives in Fond du Lac.

Capt. Francis W. Scanlan, commander of the Nevada, who administered the oath, said Patten would be assigned to the same shift as his sons in the engine room of the battleship.

Priorities Board Turns Down Industrial Request

WASHINGTON, Sept. 10.—(AP)—Industrial expansion to meet purely civilian demand was forbidden today by the supply priorities and allocations board if the planned expansion would require the use of large quantities of material critically needed for defense.

The policy was established by SPAB in the temporary denial of a proposal to expand the plant of the Tennessee Eastman corporation at Kingsport, Tenn., a manufacturer of plastics.

"Hundreds of similar applications are on hand," the board said, "and no single one can properly be granted until it is known how much of a drain on scarce materials would be involved in granting all of them."
