

Youth Placed On Trial for Murder Of His Mother

GOLDENDALE, Wash., Sept. 10.—(AP)—Eric Miller, 22, Klickitat county farm youth, went to trial for his life yesterday for the strangling of his widowed 61-year-old mother, Mrs. Annetta Miller. He was arrested May 21 after an investigation begun on the eve of her funeral.

Court officials said they expected considerable difficulty qualifying a jury because of the widespread interest and publicity on the case. A venire of 90, largest ever summoned in this county, has been called, and all women excused from jury duty in this case.

Defense Counsel Charles Bolin, Toppenish, has given no indication of the defense case. Edgar H. Canfield, youthful prosecutor, will be trying his first murder case. He will be assisted by Fred A. Smith, Goldendale, former sheriff and prosecutor.

Miller, more than two months ago pleaded guilty to the charge and officers submitted a confession as having been typed by him. When Bolin entered the case, Miller changed his plea to innocent by reason of temporary insanity.

A sanity commission held him to be sane.

A principal state's witness will be Mrs. Doris Dowers, Miller's fiancée. She has been in court custody three months.

Glendale School Shows Large Gain

GLENDAL, Ore., Sept. 11.—The Glendale school opened Monday, Sept. 8, with a registration of 238 as compared with 211 at the end of the first month a year ago. It is expected that 12 to 15 more will register in a few weeks and bring the registration up to about 250 for this year. There are 130 in the grades and of this number there are 58 boys and 72 girls. In the high school there are 108 with 52 boys and 56 girls.

There are seven new teachers on the staff this year. They are Miss Blanche Hoffman of Minnetonka, who has the third grade; Miss Hoffman attended summer school at Oregon State college.

Miss Alberta Saeve will have the fifth grade. She is a graduate of Oregon College of Education and her home is in Monmouth. She has taught in eastern Oregon.

Ted Marshall, a graduate of Southern Oregon College of Education and a resident of Medford, is the teacher of the sixth grade.

In the high school Raymond Stevens is the coach, in the place of Allen Long who has joined the flying cadets. Mr. Stevens is a graduate of Pacific university and for the past four years has been coach of the school at Almsville. His home is in Dayton.

Robert Belieu will teach science and music in the high school. He is a graduate of Oregon State college and a resident of McMinnville. He has taught the past few years at Malin.

Miss Helen Schmeltzer of Herford and a graduate of the Pacific college, and a teacher from Sherwood, will have the English classes.

The teachers to leave Glendale this year were, Miss Margaret Chase, who is teaching in Roseburg this year; Mr. Long, who has joined the flying cadets; Miss Douglas, who is teaching at Astoria; Miss Belva Wagner, who is teaching in Cottage Grove; Mrs. Nettie Theroux, who has bought the Variety store in Glendale; and Mrs. Patty, who is now making her home in Klamath Falls.

Plans are being made this year for a hot dish lunch. A small charge will be made for those who can afford it, but any who can not will receive the hot dish too. The surplus commodities will be used as far as possible. One hot dish a day will be served and each child is to bring other lunch to go with it. The kitchen is being remodeled and the lunch will be served as soon as possible.

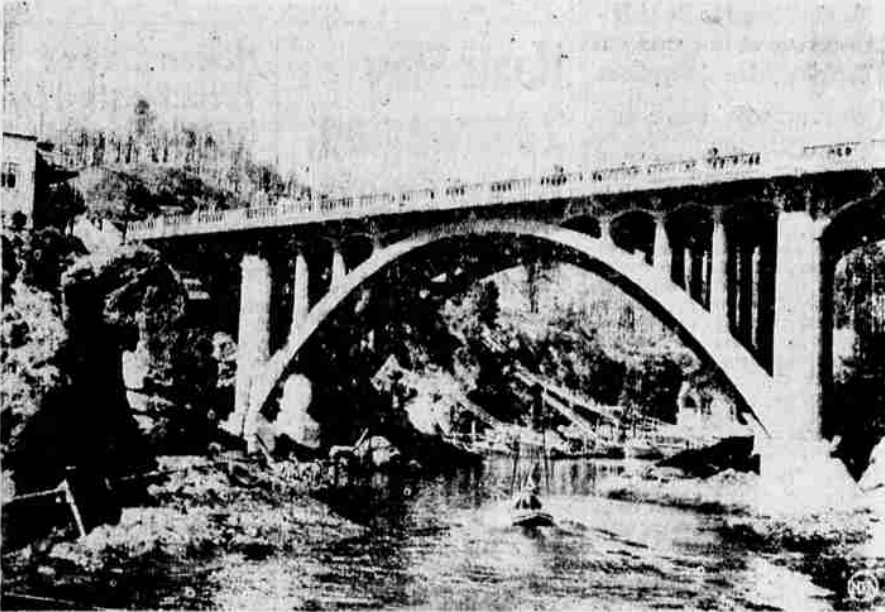

Radium's Power Outdone By Feat in Alchemy

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Sept. 11.—(AP)—A feat in alchemy which produces a new chemical more powerful than radium was reported to the American Chemical society yesterday by Dr. J. D. Kurbator, of Ohio State university.

The new chemical has rays of 2,000,000 volts compared with an average of a few hundred thousand volts for radium rays and are the same rays which physicians use in radium, Dr. Kurbator reported.

The new stuff was made by atomic bombardment in the Ohio cyclotron.

This bombardment converted strontium, the chemical used to color fireworks pink, into radio active yttrium, a chemical which does not exist in nature. It decays slowly into ordinary yttrium, a rare earth, but in so doing, its useful rays last about a week.
