

Brooklyn Defeats Cardinals, 6-4, in 11-Inning Battle

The stupendous struggle of the St. Louis Cardinals and Brooklyn Dodgers for the National league pennant keeps piling climax on top of climax.

Yesterday the Dodgers battled to a 6-4 triumph over the Cardinals in 11 innings of baseball as tense and thrilling as any world series session could be and yet their series has two more contests to go and as much remains to be decided as though the season were in its infancy.

The difference between the two teams yesterday was just two men—Camilli and Walker of the Dodgers. Camilli clouted his 33rd homer with two on to climax a four-run rally in the fourth inning. Walker singled with the bases loaded in the 11th for the winning runs.

Ernie White, young Cardinal lefthander, allowed only seven hits over the long route. Yet his hurling actually was not as effective as that of 40-year-old Fred Fitzsimmons, who gave up 10 hits before being removed for a pinch-hitter in the 11th.

Cincinnati Blanked.

In the other National league action, the New York Giants crushed the Cincinnati Reds, 6-0, with four-hit pitching by Carpenter and a five-run fifth inning. The Pittsburgh Pirates and Boston Braves divided a doubleheader. The Pirates took the opener, 7-5, scoring four runs in the second to make Heinzelman's task easy. In the nightcap Earley pitched a 10-0 shutout for the Braves, with the Pirates making six errors.

The Detroit Tigers evaded their season's series with the New York Yankees at 10-11 by winning out a 5-4 decision in 12 innings. With the bases loaded in the final chapter Higgins slipped a grounder down the third base line and Meyer beat the throw home.

Herman Besse rejoined the Philadelphia Athletics and clinched the Chicago White Sox, 2-1, in a pitching duel with Rigney in which each gave six hits. Cleveland defeated Washington, 3-5 and 3-2, with the Senators making five errors to throw away the first encounter and Milnar pitching a five-hitter in the nightcap.

Gasoline Shortage Does Exist, Aide Of Ickes Insists

WASHINGTON, Sept. 12.—(AP)—Ralph K. Davies, acting petroleum coordinator, insisted yesterday a problem of gasoline shortage "does exist" in the east, despite the finding of a senate committee that there was no shortage of petroleum products.

In a formal statement Davies mentioned no possibility of an early lifting of the sales curfew and rationing program for filling stations as proposed by the committee.

"Our appraisal of the present and future stock deficiency remains as previously reported, and the necessity for public cooperation continues," Davies declared. "To the coordinator's office, the admittedly low condition of petroleum stocks on the east coast continues to mean shortage and the necessity for appropriate action."

The committee, in a report to the senate earlier in the day, said it had concluded there was no shortage of petroleum products in the east, nor a shortage of transportation facilities, but actually a lack of large petroleum storage surplus as desired by the coordination office.

"The problem of whether insufficient surplus comprises a shortage obviously will be determined by how much demand is made upon stocks," Davies commented.

Seattle Boosted To League's Lead In 3-Team Race

Seattle takes to the tightrope today in the latest version of the Coast Baseball league's precarious balancing act.

The Rainiers teeter two percentage points above San Diego and three above Sacramento, but there was no assurance they could maintain equilibrium any longer or any better than their two predecessors on the high wire.

Dividing a double bill with San Francisco last night backed the northern club into its present position, for while this performance was in progress, San Diego lost to Oakland for the second time in four games this week and Hollywood similarly evened its series with Sacramento.

San Francisco went 11 innings to a 7-6 decision in the first game, and the Rainiers scored on a last-chance pinch single for their 32 victory in the nightcap. San Francisco wiped out the last of an initial 5-1 Seattle lead in the seventh inning of the opener and the score was tied from then until Goorabian struck off a two-run homer in the eleventh.

The Rainiers recovered half their deficit on a pair of singles in the last half of the same frame, but the rally fell short of another tie.

The bases were loaded when Pinch Hitter Bob Collins fashioned the blow which decided the second game and gave Cole victory over Seats. All Seattle scoring and hitting was limited to the fourth and final frames.

Other Games Very Close
Oakland called on Corbett's four-hit pitching to subdue San Diego, 2-1. Although never behind, Hollywood barely outlasted Sacramento, 3-2.

Two runs in the first inning on singles by Uhalt, Schulte and Kahle and Diekshot's sacrifice were what put Hollywood ahead, and Pitcher Blithorn kept the Stars in front. The Senators touched his offerings for three doubles but only five hits altogether.

San Diego grouped two of its four blows off Corbett for a run in the third inning, but the Oaks drew even with three hits in the fourth and went on to win in the sixth when Rigney singled, was sacrificed along and scored on Christoff's one-bagger.

Finest Air Force In World Slated For Army Games

WASHINGTON, Sept. 11.—(AP)—The "finest air force in the world" in point of quality of aircraft, will go into action Monday in the Louisiana maneuvers between the second and third armies, Robert A. Lovett, assistant secretary of war for air, told a press conference today.

Lovett said his estimate of the unmatched caliber of new American-built warplanes was based on "the best information available from abroad" and on tests made by United States pilots with foreign aircraft.

Deliveries, he said, have been speeded to the point of equipping a squadron—12 to 15 planes—every two days.

"In point of quantity, we still have a long way to go, but production is now beginning to roll," he said. "Our share of it from here on should enable us to equip combat units at the rate of about one squadron every other day. This rate should increase in the coming months."

Lovett said even better models of the planes he praised were "on the way."

The assistant secretary gave some hitherto undisclosed details on performance and armament of the combat planes to be placed at disposal of the second and third air task forces which will collaborate with ground troops in the mock warfare.

The sleek two-engine Lockheed P-38 interceptor, a striking departure in pursuit ship design, is the "fastest military plane in the world today" with a speed well over 400 miles an hour with full military load, Lovett said.

It is powerfully armed with two 37 millimeter cannon and an unstated number of 50 caliber machine guns.

Besides the P-38, the second and third army air commanders will have two other types of pursuit ships, the Bell P-39 "cannon with wings" and the brand new Curtis P-40E; two types of medium bombers, the Martin B-26 and the North American B-25; the Douglas A-20 attack bomber, or light bomber; and the Douglas

A-24 dive bomber, the same plane as the navy's dive bomber which is recognized as the finest in existence.

Nazi Spying on American Exports Bared at Trial

NEW YORK, Sept. 12.—(AP)—Federal Bureau of Investigation Agent C. Ellsworth yesterday produced in court a succession of messages purported to be from a German "outlaw" radio station calling upon friends in America to furnish details of American production and export of planes to Britain and France.

Read into evidence at the trial of 16 men on espionage charges, one message, received by a "spy radio station" operated by the FBI on Long Island since May 31, 1940, said:

"Need urgently from all friends monthly production airplane factories, exports to all countries, especially to England and France; number, type, date of delivery by steamer or air; armament or armament; payment cash and carry or credit. Rose has \$200 for you not for Stein. Greetings."

U. S. Attorney Harold M. Kennedy identified Rose as a messenger in the espionage ring.

Utah Gasoline Retailers To Close 12 Hours Daily

SALT LAKE CITY, Sept. 12.—(AP)—Utah gasoline retailers will close their filling stations nightly from 7 p. m. to 7 a. m., effective September 15.

Conservation and attractive jobs in defense industries have produced a shortage of attendants, the operators explained. In addition, the curfew was planned as a conservation measure, although there is no imminent shortage in the mountain states.

Clifford W. Hall, secretary of the Petroleum Dealers' association, said 1,450 dealers throughout the state agreed to the closing and 57 opposed it.
