5 Die in Mimic War in Louisiana

SHREVEPORT, La., Sept. 15. (AP)—Two officers and three enlisted men were killed in north Louisiana in accidents Sunday night and today, marking the opening of the war maneuvers between the second and third armies.

The victims: An officer tentatively identified as Second Lieut. John Bobroski, of Racine, Wis., air corps reserve, Mitchell Field, N. Y., stationed temporarily at Barksdale, field, killed in a plane crash at Coushatta.

Capt. Lamar T. Woodward, headquarters company, 89th armored regiment, a regular army officer from Fort Knox, Ky., killed near Minden in a highway accident during Sunday night's blackout.

Corporal Hamilton W. White, company C, first armored regiment, from Los Gatos, Calif., killed when a half-ton truck overturned on highway 13 net hunt at 9:45 p. m., Sunday.

Pvt. William A. Jones, company C, first armored regiment, from Weeksville, Ky., killed in the same accident.

Pvt. E. D. Hightower, company F, 83rd infantry killed at 12:40 a. m., in a two and one-half ton truck accident in the second army maneuver area.

All were attached to the second army.

Democracy Must Be Battled For, Sgt. York Reminds

MILWAUKEE, Sept. 15. (AP)—

Sergeant Alvin C. York, of Tennessee, one of the ranking

heroes of the World war and an

advocate of all-out aid to Russia

as a means of stopping nazi Germany,

wants the American Legion national convention to play

an important part in moulding the foreign policy of the United States.

Sergeant York spoke last night at a religious-patriotic service for Legionnaires on the eve of the first business session of the annual convention — faced with serious decision on problems arising from the foreign conflict.

An avowed interventionist, York urged the Legion to stay out of politics but to take a big hand in shaping the nation's foreign policy.

"For we who are here have learned a lesson," he said. "We learned that liberty, freedom and democracy are not inherited. We know that a country cannot fight to win them once and then stop. We learned the hard way that liberty and freedom and democracy are prizes awarded only to those people who fight to win them — and then fight eternally to hold them."

Reports of the Legion's standing committees, including that of the national defense group, which recommended that geographic limitations of the use of American troops be abolished, will be turned over today to new committees. They will draw up the recommendations on which the convention will act before adjournment Thursday.
