Squawking Over \$5 "Use Tax" On Autos Predicted

Tucked away in the \$3,500,000,000 federal tax bill is a little-discussed tax which some pretty shrewd observers of John Q. Taxpayer's reactions say is going to cause more squawks than anything else in the whole measure. It's the \$5 "use tax" on motor vehicles. It means very plainly that every one of the 32,000,000 owners of trucks, buses and private automobiles in the land will have to fork over \$5 a year, beginning Feb. 1, 1942, for the privilege of using their vehicles.

The auto people and the American Automobile association (which has withdrawn its traditional opposition to any tax on auto transportation for the duration of national defense) gave me this analysis of the new tax.

Two-Way Benefit
First, it should be pointed out that the fewer cars the next year or so, the better for national defense (because of needed materials) and anything that taxation does to reduce the number will have the double-barreled benefit of bringing in revenue and saving those materials. Then, too, when there is anything on which you can slap a little \$5 tax and add \$160,000,000 to the treasury's income it's not to be tossed off because of a few squawks. At least, that's the way the tax framers must have reasoned.

To go back to the other side of the picture, the \$5 "use tax" is in addition to a doubling of existing rates on cars, parts, accessories, tires and tubes and a continuation of the tax on gasoline and lubricating oils. This, according to the AAA, means that motorists will pay \$300,000,000 more in federal taxes next year, bringing their total federal tax payment for operating a car to approximately \$750,000,000.

These taxes are in addition to all state, county and city taxes (on jalopies and their drivers) of which there are by actual count 14 different varieties. Although not all of these bloom in any section, majority do in many. The thing about some of them (and all of the federal taxes) is that, until now, you couldn't see them unless you looked at the bill of sale, or the posted price of gasoline and oil. With the "use tax" it's going to be different. It will be just \$5 across the counter, with maybe a little sticker for the windshield or another little receipt to add to the file of "debts paid." Congress handed the treasury the "use tax" without any instructions for collection and about the only method suggested so far is that stickers be put on sale at post-offices.

Pacific Ports Bid For Aid Cargoes

(AP)—Pacific coast foreign traders started a drive today to make western seaports the principal bases for American shipments to British forces in the Red sea area.

A group headed by Joseph F. Marias, president of the San Francisco harbor board, sought the support of the Pacific coast trade conference, in session here, to activate the proposal.

Marias said 100 ships operating from Pacific ports could transport as much cargo as 113 ships operating from the Atlantic coast to the Red sea could carry.

Sea lanes would be shorter and safer, Marias said, and should the Red sea be bottled up or declared a prohibited zone for American ships, the unloading of cargoes at Basra, Iraq, or some Indian port would save time.

William F. Minehan, president of the San Francisco foreign trade association, said the shift of shipping bases from the east to the west coast would restore a flow of raw materials to Pacific slope industry. The potential shutdown of supplies, he said, is threatening the activity of many defense and non-defense plants along the western seaboard.

Repayment will be made by Haiti by shipments of Haitian products to this country.

Officials said the products to be imported from Haiti would be covered in other agreements to be signed in the future and would probably include rubber, sugar, cocoa, fibers and other raw materials.

The United States and Haiti are already cooperating in defense measures in the Caribbean through the construction of an air field near Port Au-Prince, which may be utilized by both commercial and military planes.

Disabled War Vets Get Part Tax Exemption

SALEM, Sept. 16.—(AP)—A 1941 amendment exempting disabled war veterans from paying property taxes on the first \$1,000 value of their homes becomes effective next January 1, and veterans must make application for exemption by September 1. Attorney General Van Winkle ruled today for the state military department.

Disabled veterans, however, are not exempt if they receive more than \$1,250 a year in federal pensions. They must be 40 per cent disabled in order to qualify. Claims must be made each year to obtain exemption.

Convict Fails In Break Via Water

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 16.—(AP)—Days of discipline in the solitary cells of Alcatraz—penalty for failure in an escape attempt—were ahead today for John R. Bayless, 27, Missouri bank robber serving a 25-year federal prison sentence.

Taking advantage of his limited freedom as a member of a convict garbage gang, Bayless yesterday eluded guards momentarily and slipped away into a fog that rolled suddenly over Alcatraz Island.

But his absence was noticed and the prison siren immediately screamed an alarm, putting all guards on the alert.

Bayless got to the shore, clambered over some rocks, and slipped into the water. A few strokes would have carried him out of sight, but at that moment a guard sighted him, raised a gun and shouted to Bayless to come back.

Bayless obeyed, and the guard helped him to shore. The convict was sick from salt water he had swallowed, and shivering from the cold. Guards took him to the prison hospital for treatment of the effects of exposure before he was subjected to discipline.
