

Seattle Holds Big Edge In Race For Coast League Flag

Seattle had its third straight Coast league championship virtually within grasp today, after hustling into first place late in the season with an astonishing rally.

With six games yet to play, the Rainiers held a three-game lead over second place Sacramento. By winning three more games, they can clinch the pennant, even if Sacramento should capture all five contests remaining on its schedule.

Seattle took over the lead two weeks ago, overhauling a 16-game advantage the Solons held at mid-

season. The Rainiers increased their margin a full game last night by defeating Los Angeles, while Oakland thumped Sacramento and reduced the Solons' pennant chances to the mathematical category.

The Rainiers edged Los Angeles 1 to 0 in the opening game of a double-header, and played to a scoreless tie in the nightcap, which ended in the eighth inning because of the Coast league curfew.

Jess Dobner limited Seattle to three hits in the opener, but issued a walk in the ninth inning with the bases loaded to give the Rainiers their winning score. Hal Turpin stopped the Angels with seven scattered safeties.

In the nightcap, Jess Flores likewise yielded only three hits, while Les Webber gave up four for Seattle. Neither team was able to bunch their blows, how-

ever, and the game ended scoreless.

Oakland blasted a tie in the ninth inning and nipped Sacramento, 6 to 5. Mel Duezabou singled, stole second, and scored the winning run on Bill Rigney's single to center. The Oaks collected four runs in the fourth inning off George Munger.

Hollywood set San Diego down for the third consecutive time, 5 to 1, and eliminated the third-place Padres from the title chase. The loss put San Diego five-and-a-half games behind Seattle.

Portland collected six runs on errors, and defeated San Francisco 6 to 4. The Beavers got three runs in the sixth when Don White dropped Herman Reich's fly, and Errol Fernandez bobbled two grounders in the eighth, setting up three more runs.

Dodgers Still Retain Slim Hold On First Place

The favorite flippancy of baseball players is "I'd rather be lucky than good" and this little crumb of wisdom explains why the Brooklyn Dodgers still are in first place in the National league and seem destined to win the pennant.

They are fate's fair-haired boys even though their lead has shrunk like a dollar shirt in the last couple of days.

Their daily adventures read like chapters out of a story book and yesterday they outdid that fictional piker, Merriwell, again. Brooklyn was on the verge of dropping its second straight game, trailing 3-1 going into the ninth inning at Pittsburgh. A loss coupled with a double victory by St. Louis over the Boston Braves would have transferred first place to the Cardinals by a tiny percentage margin.

But what happened? You guessed it, the Dodgers scored five runs in the ninth inning and beat the Pirates 6-4 to retain a one-game margin over the Cards, who whipped the Braves 6-1 and 3-2.

Cards Win Two.
The Cardinals had a tough time taking their two victories from the Braves and must have been disheartened at seeing the Dodgers dance back out of the furnace at Pittsburgh.

In the first game Howard Pollet and Tom Early waged a beautiful hurling duel till the eighth inning. The Braves scored first, a run in the fifth, and old Estel Crabtree, at 37 the miracle man of the Cards, tied the score with a homer in the seventh. Then in the eighth Buddy Hassett made an error with the bases loaded and St. Louis grabbed five runs and victory. In the second game Max Lanier and Jim Tobin gave another magnificent mound show—Lanier allowing five hits and Tobin six and the teams came up to the last of the ninth in a 2-2 deadlock. And Crabtree hammered out another home run!

The Cincinnati Reds bagged a doubleheader from the Phils 1-0 and 3-2. John Vander Meer pitched a three-hitter and fanned 11 in the first game and Gene Thompson pitched a six-hitter and made two doubles and a single himself in the nightcap. The Chicago Cubs climbed on the New York Giants 7-3.

In the American league the New York Yankees clipped the Chicago White Sox 5-3 with a four-run fifth-inning rally climaxed by Tom Henrich's 31st homer with two on. The Boston Red Sox edged out Cleveland 3-2 with Joe Dodson pitching six-hit ball and Dom DiMaggio driving in all Boston's runs—two on a single with the bases loaded in the ninth. Detroit downed the Philadelphia Athletics 3-2 although out-hit 7-4 and Washington whipped the St. Louis Browns 9-8 in 10 innings.
