New Features In 1942 AAA Program Receive Approval

Streamlined to meet the demands of national defense and simplified for easy administration the 1942 AAA program for Oregon is rapidly taking shape and will be available at county AAA offices in handbook form before October 1, the state AAA office has announced.

Most important change in the program is the abandonment of soil-depleting, commercial vegetable and total allotments and the substitution of a minimum soil conserving acreage requirement, thus lending greater flexibility to meet defense production requirements and still emphasizing soil conservation.

Under this provision, payments on wheat and potato crop allotments will be conditioned on 20 per cent of the farm's crop land being devoted to soil conserving uses. These include perennial grasses and perennial legumes, biennial legumes, sudan or annual ryegrass for pasture, seeded cover crops, Austrian winter peas and vetch for seed, and certain

weed control practices on irrigated land.

In the summer fallow counties of eastern Oregon, the state committee has recommended that protected summer fallow qualify as a soil conserving use, providing 10 per cent of the crop land on the farm is devoted to permanent grasses or legumes.

The possibility of marketing quotas for potatoes has made it necessary to set potato allotments for all farms in the state growing three acres or more. In the past potato allotments were established only in certain counties designated as commercial potato areas. Procedure for setting allotments has been changed somewhat.

The wheat program remains much the same as last year, except that it will not be necessary to grow up to 80 per cent of a farm's allotment to qualify for special crop payments. A new practice provides for application of boron or borax in connection with the seeding of leguminous cover crops and perennial legumes.

Changes in the range program, combined this year with the farm for the practices of rotational and limited grazing under approved plans, to encourage conservation on smaller ranches and on western Oregon livestock farms.

Range Lamb Prices Hit New High at Lakeview

LAKEVIEW, Sept. 22. (AP)—Range lambs commanded the best prices ever paid in this section—\$100 a head—at the Oregon Woolgrowers' association ram sale.

The Withers ranch, Paisley, paid that for a pen of five Rambouillet rams from the Cunningham Shum Sheep company of Pendleton. John O'Leary, Paisley, bought a Corriedale two-year-old stud from R. C. Burkhardt, Lebanon, for \$100.

Mac Hoke, association president, said the sale indicated demand was heavier than elsewhere in the state. He said the sale which brought \$11,209.50, an average of \$47.30 for the 237 rams auctioned, would be an annual September affair.

A flock-selecting and pullorum-testing school for turkey breeders has been arranged by the Oregon Turkey Improvement Association to be held at the poultry department of O. S. C. September 30. Any producer who plans to participate in the turkey improvement program and have his breeders approved or tested under official state supervision will find value in this school, according to N. L. Bennion, poultry extension specialist.

The program of instruction and discussion will start at 10 o'clock and continue all day. The school is planned as a means of giving instruction to those desiring to qualify as flock-selecting and blood-drawing agents for work in the turkey improvement program.
