Injuries Also Numerous In Widely Scattered Northwest Accidents

KLAMATH FALLS, Sept. 22.—(AP)—Mrs. Beten Ellen Beman, 20, San Francisco, was fatally injured early Sunday morning when the car she was driving rolled off The Dalles-California highway 67 miles north of here.

Mrs. Beman died late yesterday in a Klamath Falls hospital. Her husband, Harold Beman, 23, Bethlehem shipyard employee, was asleep in the back seat at the time of the crash and was uninjured.

SALEM, Sept. 22.—(AP)—J. B. McClain, 65, Silverton, died in a hospital here last night from injuries received Saturday when his car left the Silverton-Woodburn highway and overturned. Harry Leroy Linck, 42, Portland, was in a critical condition at a Salem hospital today from injuries received early yesterday when his car collided on the Salem-Dallas highway with one driven by Don Brook, 21, Willamette university student.

CADLWELL, Idaho, Sept. 22.—(AP)—John Elmer Scott, 51, Nyssa, Ore., died Saturday night of a shotgun wound. Sheriff A. A. Moline said the wound was self-inflicted. Friends told the sheriff Scott had been despondent.

ST. MARIES, Idaho, Sept. 22.—(AP)—John T. Hanrahan, 40-year-old Milwaukee railroad brakeman, who was seriously scalded in a freight train wreck 30 miles from here Saturday, died today.

He was the fifth person to die of train wreck injuries in north Idaho over the week-end.

Delbert M. Hoffman, 61, engineer, and Harry Ferrier, 52, fireman, died Saturday in the same wreck when their train hit a rock slide. All three lived at Malden, Wash.

Near Wallace, L. O. Amos and T. W. Friend, Northern Pacific bridge crew men from Missoula, Mont., were killed when a speeder they were riding was hit by a freight Saturday.

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 22.—(AP)—A passenger, Mrs. Isabel Fendall, Salem, was killed and the drivers of two automobiles injured in a head-on collision on the Pacific highway north of Canby Saturday.

PORTLAND, Sept. 22.—(AP)—A truck overturned on Portland's outskirts Saturday night, fatally injuring Mrs. William Thomas, Portland, and injuring five other bean pickers.
