Army Officer Shot By Customs Guard

HONOLULU, Sept. 23.—(AP)—Second Lieut. Martin R. Connelly, 26, army air corps officer of Syracuse, N. Y., was shot and killed during an argument with a customs guard Monday at the pier where the steamship President Cleveland was docked.

Benjamin Vankuren, captain of detectives, and Leon Straus, detective in charge of the homicide squad, said Connelly was leaving the ship, just in from Manila, with Miss Naomi Berman, an army nurse, when the guard challenged Connelly and asked to see a package he was carrying. Connelly replied that the package already had been inspected, the detectives said, and an argument ensued.

The package proved to be photographs and Connelly was searched.

Police said witnesses heard Connelly say "go ahead and shoot," whereupon a shot was fired and the officer fell.

Attention Called to Septic Tank Rules

Warning was issued today by the Douglas county health department to persons owning septic tanks that care must be taken in disposal of sludge. The state law, it was pointed out, requires that all sludge must be buried at least two feet deep.

The warning was evoked because of the receipt of reports that some persons travelling about the country engaged in the occupation of cleaning tanks, have failed to comply with the law, necessitating later additional expense to the owner.

If owners of septic tanks employ someone to do the cleaning for them they should ascertain that the sludge is buried as the law requires, the department states.

Inventory of Trucks In Oregon Ordered

SALEM, Sept. 23.—(AP)—Secretary of State Earl Snell, at the request of the war department, will begin a defense inventory of trucks and buses next Thursday, when questionnaires will be mailed to the 65,000 Oregon owners of trucks and buses.

The WPA will help tabulate the results.

Snell said the inventory would provide necessary information to enable the government to avoid a tie-up of transportation.

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News of 4-H CLUBS

Premium checks and ribbons have been received from the state fair management by County Club Agent E. A. Britton for five of the Douglas county 4-H exhibitors. This year the exhibits were classified under blue, red, and white ribbon classes. A blue ribbon was received for Marjorie Wright on her exhibit of five jars of canned meat. This exhibit will be shown again at the Pacific International Livestock Exposition in competition with canned meat exhibits from other states of the northwest.

Checks and red ribbons were received for Josephine Wright, clothing five exhibit; Leta Mae Brant, clothing four exhibit; Maxine Wright, clothing three exhibit, and Jack Cabot, cookery one exhibit.

The first request to be made for one of the woodworking tool kits was made by Edenbower school woodworking club. Mrs. Nell Fisher is teacher of the upper grades of this school. Boys of this school had a splendid woodworking club last year and expect to carry on this year. The use of the tools will assist the boys a lot as it is usually pretty difficult for them to bring tools from home. County Club Agent E. A. Britton states there are ten of these tool kits, each of which contains a hand saw, 2 hammers, 2 try squares, a block plane, hand drill, pliers, screw driver, nail set, wood clamps, wood chisel, a key-hole saw, and coping saw. These kits are for loan to woodworking clubs throughout the project year and must be returned intact when the project has been completed.

The livestock club of Smith River held a field day yesterday. Each member of the club brought his or her dairy calf for judging. William Cookson, leader of the club, saw to it that everything was in order for a good showing. The dairy helpers were judged and then a showmanship contest followed.
