Donation for Books Is Made to State Library

SALEM, Sept. 23.—(AP)—The two sisters of the late state librarian Harriet C. Long, who died last July 4, gave Governor Charles A. Sprague today a check for \$1,000 to be used to buy books for the state library.

The sisters are Miss Frances L. Long, Santa Barbara, Calif., and Mrs. Margaret Long Whisenand, Peoria, Ill. They asked that the money be invested by the state treasurer, with the income from the investment to be used to buy books for which other funds are not available.

"We have a feeling of deep satisfaction in the work which she accomplished in Oregon and are glad to know that in this small way some of that work may continue," the sisters wrote. The state library board is expected to name Miss Long's successor within a few months.

One of the members of the board asked him: How do you handle your discouragements? Do you make them stepping stones? To those who are in the leadership of the world, the pathway is thick with unexpected difficulties, and sometimes there is little or no light. But a careful waiting upon God will clear up every situation. We need to learn the art of waiting upon God. Ships at sea give us a parable for such occasions. Formerly when the ships met a storm they would immediately take the defense. They would draw in the sails, close the hatches, fasten down movable objects, then endure it somehow. Today mighty Leviathans act differently—with full speed ahead they drive fearlessly into the teeth of the storm. In the face of storms of discouragement we, too, must put on full speed ahead, looking to the Master Pilot for our encouragement. If God be for us who can be against us?
