

Lou Nova Full Of Confidence That He'll Whip Louis

POMPTON LAKES, N. J., Sept. 24.—(AP)—Lou Nova tossed a final right hand shot at sparring partner Johnny Aichers as the going soured, then leaned over

the ropes and remarked, "this guy's a lot tougher than Louis." There is nothing but contempt for the Joe Louis punching power, his durability and even his heart in this camp of the hero of the cosmic punch, who has a battle date with the bomber Monday night in New York. Up here, the No. 1 boy is just another guy named Joe.

"What is it about Louis that makes you fellows call him a superman?" Nova pook-pooked in between ladders with his dynamic stance and his yogi magic. "Sure, he has been knocking over fellows for more than five years, and he's a pretty fair puncher. But do I look like one of those has-beens or never-wases that he's grown fat on?" You have to acknowledge the big fellow might have something there. He is bothered by a mild case of incompatibility of the feet and he does some things that look amateurish in action. Yet no one Louis has met up to now was as powerful and as loaded with confidence and what the swanky set on Jacobs beach call ticker.

GREENWOOD LAKE, N. Y., Sept. 24.—(AP)—Joe Louis, who has been accused of lacking interest in training for his numerous title defenses in the past year or so, seems to be getting stirred up about next week's scrap with Lou Nova.

Joe not only belabored four sparring partners with vicious intent in yesterday's drill but he didn't even want to stop when his headgear slipped off in a

brisk exchange with George Nicholson. He tossed the protective armor aside and started to wade in again, but Promoter Mike Jacobs, thinking of what might happen to the expected \$700,000 gate if Louis should receive a cut, rushed to the ringside and saw to it that the workout was halted until the headgear was replaced.

Louis weighed 265 pounds after the drill.

Seattle Defeats Stars on Errors

All along the Dodgers have been insisting that the Cards could not sweep through the Pittsburgh Pirates and the Chicago Cubs and Brooklyn had it figured exactly. The Cardinals came a cropper at Pittsburgh yesterday, 4-0, in the first game of a doubleheader and even though they won the second game 9-0, the damage was done.

The Cards whipped themselves yesterday. They made five errors, two by shortstop Marion, and Cooper, their most reliable right-hander, got knocked out of

the box in the first inning.

In the nightcap the Cards came back with the fierceness of avengers. Max Lanier, a south-paw, pitched fine eight-hit ball, the Pirates made four errors, and the Cards made two home runs—one on and the other by Crabtree with two aboard.

The Chicago Cubs clipped the Cincinnati Reds 5-1 with big Lee keeping eight hits scattered and the Reds making four errors. The New York Giants and Phillies divided a doubleheader. Melton gave six successive singles in the first inning of the first game and the Phils paraded to victory 8-2, then New York turned the tables and won the nightcap 8-6.

The Philadelphia Athletics spoiled Red Buffing's world series tuneup by batting him out of the box in the ninth inning and winning 9-8.

Washington scored twice in the ninth to beat the Boston Red Sox 4-3 and Detroit rallied for three in the tenth to stop the St. Louis Browns 4-1, lifting the Tigers into tie for third place.
