Aluminum Gather Falls Under OPM Estimate

WASHINGTON, Sept. 24.—(AP)—The nationwide aluminum collection campaign yielded an estimated 11,835,139 pounds of scrap, defense officials announced today—a total equivalent to the amount of aluminum needed in 1900 fighter planes or 350 four-motored bombers.

The campaign, conducted from July 21 to 29, fell below officials' expectations, however, for the OPM had predicted that 15,000,000 to 20,000,000 pounds of scrap would be collected.

Experts estimated that the net yield of aluminum from the scrap would be about 7,000,000 pounds. The remainder of the weight represented other materials, primarily iron and steel, which were attached to the aluminum articles.
