

Airlines Ordered Fly Only at Night

SPOKANE, Sept. 24—(AP)—Operations of commercial airlines between sunrise and sunset—the daylight hours—were ordered discontinued here by the Civil Aeronautics Authority today. In telegrams received by Mayor Frank Sutherland, United Airlines and Northwest Airlines, the C. A. A. set Sept. 25, next Thursday, as the final day in which the lines might operate from the Spokane airport, Fells Field, without adequate control facilities.

The telegrams were from Donald H. Connolly, C. A. A. administrator. An alternative proposal, which would permit greatly restricted operations to Spokane, the Mayor said, but he refused to comment on the plan pending a conference between city officials, and R. D. Bedinger of Seattle, regional C. A. A. manager.

The flight between the city and the C. A. A., seeking a control tower and other facilities for directing traffic at the airport, has been underway since last spring when the basing of two seaplane army planes at the field congested the traffic to the point that the C. A. A. said it could not be handled safely without control facilities.

Since that time the city has passed two deadlines for construction of such a tower and civilian pilot training has been discontinued at the field.

Army flying, directed by the air corps' own control tower, is not affected. Airline operations men explained the daylight flights were the ones curtailed since it was during those hours the congestion was the greatest. Six of 10 Northwest Airlines and three or four United schedules would be affected.

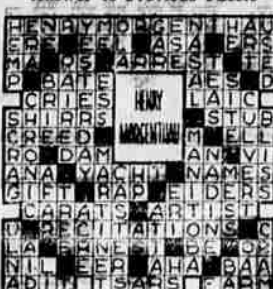

Plan to Curb Wage Increases Offered

WASHINGTON, Sept. 25.—(AP)—Price Administrator Leon Henderson has told congress that voluntary agreements to prevent wage increases were "the next step" in the administration's effort to avert inflation.

Testifying before the house banking committee on the administration's price control bill, Henderson said such agreements with labor were not only feasible but "highly likely."

"That's what Hillman has been working for," he added, referring to Sidney Hillman, OPM director.

Henderson told the committee that despite the broad powers held by the British government to regulate both wages and prices, there was "much more reliance placed on voluntary understandings there than on the law."

Discussion of whether wage controls should be included in a price regulation bill was stimulated in the committee when Bernard M. Baruch, world war head of the war industries board, advocated a universal ceiling over all elements of the price structure.

When Representative Monroney (D-Okla.) asked about British attempts to control wages, Henderson said he thought that the experience in both England and Canada should be the "very best arguments" against including wage control in this bill.

At the opening of "a great effort," Henderson testified, "you can not get the cooperation necessary by fixing wages."

"Wages should be kept in restraint," he added, saying, "there should be no unwarranted increases."
