Last spring Mr. and Mrs. Cory had a most enjoyable trip by Pan-American clipper and the Canadian steamship "Lady Hawkins" throughout all of the important islands of the West Indies, including Haiti, Porto Rico, Virgin Islands, Antigua, St. Lucia and Trinidad. The trip included British Guiana, Great Britain's only possession in South America.

These pictures are of the native life on these islands, including their cock fights, harvesting sugar cane and sisal, brilliant tropical flowers and shrubs, native markets, beauty parlors, and other scenes on these very islands which have suddenly assumed such an important place in the defense program of the United States. These islands, which have been well called the "gems of the Caribbean" were discovered by Columbus on his first and second voyages and will be the stations of many of the young men from various sections of the United States who will be sent to these new defense bases near the Panama Canal.

Mrs. Solon Wells Dies Suddenly Of Heart Attack

Stumbling across the street to the home of a neighbor, Mrs. Solon (Mary Edith) Wells, 57, of 129 S. Flint St., collapsed in a chair and died almost immediately, Wednesday afternoon.

Mrs. Wells had been in poor health for several days, although she had continued her work at a local hotel until Wednesday.

Apparently feeling the approach of a heart attack, she went across the street to the G. W. Chamberlain home at 128 S. Flint St., where she fell unconscious into a chair. She apparently died almost immediately, according to the physician who found her dead upon his arrival at the Chamberlain home.

Born at Big Shanty, Pennsylvania, Nov. 26, 1883, she was married to Solon Wells at Limestone, New York, July 19, 1900, and came with her family to Roseburg from Broken Arrow, Oklahoma, about six years ago.

Surviving are the husband and two daughters, Mrs. Maxine Anderson, Independence, Ore., and Mrs. Pauline Norman, Roseburg. She also leaves a stepbrother, Norman Clark, who resides in Pennsylvania.

Funeral services will be held in the chapel of the Douglas Funeral home at 2 p. m. Friday, Rev. C. A. Edwards officiating. Interment will follow in the Elgarose cemetery.
