Unusual Surgical Task Performed by Dr. Hall Seely

Dr. Hall Seely, son of Dr. and Mrs. A. C. Seely of this city, recently conducted an operation in one of the most unusual accident cases to be reported, according to word brought back by his father who, with Mrs. Seely, has been visiting in San Francisco where Hall Seely is employed as physician and surgeon for the United Airlines.

A workman engaged in the sharpening of a power drill picked up the tool, which accidentally started whirling and bored a hole through his abdomen and into his spine. Dr. L. H. Fraser, contract physician for the shipyard in which the injured man, Charles Harris, was employed, called young Dr. Seely to do the surgical repair work.

At last reports it was believed the injured workman would recover. He had been given numerous blood transfusions, with blood being offered by nearly all of the 5,000 men employed in the shipyard. He has a partial paralysis of one leg, Dr. Seely reported he was informed by his son, but it is very probable that he will recover completely.

WPA Workers to Get Wage Boost

WASHINGTON, Sept. 27.—(AP)—Howard Hunter, works projects commission, announced yesterday he planned to raise the wages of over 1,000,000 WPA workers, to bring their earnings nearer into line with the increased cost of living.

Although giving no figure on the extent of such a raise, Hunter said 10 per cent would be "a good guess."

"I think we can expect some action within 30 days," he told a press conference.

At the same time, Hunter said he expected WPA rolls to swell this winter due to "priorities" unemployment.

He added that the increases in WPA employment would be made despite stipulations in the last WPA appropriation that the rolls should be kept within a 1,000,000 average over a year.

Hunter said WPA wages had been in effect for two years on the present scale, during which time, he said, industrial wages had increased 32 per cent and food prices had gone up 15 per cent.

Present WPA scales run from \$31.20 to \$81.90 a month in the south up to a \$39 minimum and a \$94.90 maximum in the north.

MARKET REPORTS

WOOL

BOSTON, Sept. 27.—(AP)—The Commercial Bulletin today says:

"Although price levels have been fully maintained in the wool market this week, the velocity of sales has diminished very considerably, due to the fact that manufacturers have been marking time, with diminished civilian demand for fabrics and pending the awards by the government against the bids taken September 15th.

"Purchases in the west have fallen off noticeably, except possibly in Texas, where 434 to 451 cents has been paid for good to choice 12-months clips. Fall Texas, of which a million pounds were purchased last week at 40 cents have been slow.

"Purchases of the new Australian clip for this country to Sept. 15 are officially reported at 114,893 bales. Arrangements have been made for the substitution of up to 400,000 bales of cape wools for Australian in the British reserve stock of 250 million pounds to be stored here, against which 115 million pounds of Australian have been shipped already.

"Mohair prices are firmer here in line with the higher prices paid in Texas last week, which, however, have not been repeated this week."
