DR. CHAS. A. EDWARDS

In times of war prepare for peace, reverses a popular proverb but the reversal is warranted. What, pray, is the price of world peace. For one thing it will cost the nations the surrender of some of their national sovereignty. Partnership inevitably limits the independence of the partners, declares Dr. Fosdick. What nation is ready to pay this price. For another thing, world peace will cost the surrender of vested interests in war, viz.: the profit of the munitions makers. Are the merchants of death ready to pay this price, and will the statesmen of the world agree to this price. Again Dr. Fosdick says: "We cannot have a predatory economic system and still expect peace. Are the statesmen of the world, kings, rulers, dukes, presidents, ready to pay this price? If Christianity is to survive, world peace will have to come. It may be long in coming but unless it comes either the Christian teachings will triumph, or crass paganism, however much it may be dressed up, will prevail. It is inconceivable that anybody of sane mind wants war to persist. It is necessary to be wholeheartedly and persistently for peace. The price of peace is costly but nothing like as costly as war. Amen.

Marion Miley, Famous Golfer, Slain by Thieves

LEXINGTON, Ky., Sept. 29.—(AP)—Detective Captain Joe Harrigan said today that police, investigating the hold-up slaying of Marion Miley, 27-year-old nationally famed golfer, and the serious wounding of her mother at the aristocratic Lexington Country club, were "stumped" in their effort to bear down on two masked thieves who shot the women and escaped with \$135.

Miss Miley was shot through the head and chest, and her mother, Mrs. Fred Miley, 50, was hit three times in the abdomen, after being roused early yesterday morning by two robbers at their country club apartment demanding location of the money.

Mrs. Miley, club manager, stumbled through the darkened building to a sanatorium 300 yards away from where police were called. She was taken to a hospital where the three slugs were removed.

Glenn Wimberly Bags Big Cougar

While onlookers gasped at an eight-foot cougar displayed in the window at the Churchill hardware store today, Glenn V. Wimberly, local banker who killed the huge cat, passed the whole thing off as "not very exciting."

Wimberly shot the cougar Friday morning on Gooseberry burn, near Twin lakes, on the North Umpqua river.

Deer hunting with George and Jack Wharton of Roseburg, Mr. Wimberly was lying in wait on a rimrock, overlooking the burn. Suddenly looking around, he spotted the cougar about 60 feet away, on another rimrock above and behind him.

The cougar spotted Wimberly at the same moment, he said. He raised his gun and fired, hitting the cat in the neck. Wounded, the animal started down a ravine toward the hunter, and Wimberly fired another shot, this one hitting the animal in the shoulder. Two more shots were necessary to finish off the big cat.

Mr. Wimberly reported deer to be very scarce in the district, attributing this to the activity of cougars, who apparently have killed a number of deer in the Twin lakes area.

Harry Bridges' Ouster Recommended by Sears

es' counsel, commented, "There is no doubt that we will file exceptions." This is the method of appeal in such cases. An actual deportation order would be issued by the attorney general. Thirty days is allowed to file exceptions. Bridges himself was reported on the way from New York to San Francisco.

Coast Storm Center

Bridges, president of the CIO International longshoremen's and warehousemen's union, has been the storm center of labor discussions on the Pacific coast ever since he led waterfront workers in a coastwide strike in 1934. It was in this strike that he skyrocketed from an obscure waterfront worker to a labor leader whose deportation was urged by various organizations throughout the country.

For the past seven years he has been a bitter rival of Lundberg, who vies with him for dominance of Pacific coast maritime circles.

In his first hearing, which set a nine week record in 1939, Bridges was cleared of similar charges by James Landis, dean of the Harvard law school who sat as examiner. The records of this trial was broken by two weeks in the second hearing, at which Sears sat.

Bridges admitted membership in the I. W. W., to which he belonged a few months shortly after entering the United States in 1920, but denied the other charges.

"Shocked," Attorney Says
Richard Gladstein, Bridges' attorney, issued this statement in New York:

"We are deeply shocked at the decision which will be received by thousands of union men and women with resentment and indignation. Naturally we shall exhaust every legal channel of appeal to remedy the grave wrong that has been done."
