The selective service October quota of eight men for Douglas county has been filled and no additional calls for men are expected this month. R. L. Preston, chairman of the board, announced today.

The highest order number that has been called is 227. There are 2961 registrants in Douglas county eligible for service.

Couglas county men in various branches of the service at the present time total 418, of which 50 are selectees.

At the present 49 men are classified in 1-A and are available for immediate induction into the armed forces; 35 men are classified for limited service, 179 are in the 1-H group, the over 28-year-old men and 895 are in class III, the class deferred because of dependents.
