

Seattle Twice Blanks Hollywood To Reach Finals

(By the Associated Press)
Champion Seattle was in the final round of the Coast league Shaughnessy baseball playoffs against Sacramento today, after staging a rally as spectacular as when it overcame a 16-game deficit to capture the pennant.

The Rainiers went into their double-header with fourth-place Hollywood at Seattle last night trailing two games to three—but blasted the Stars 2 to 0 in both contests to take the seven-game preliminary series and advance to the finals. Sacramento, league runner-up, had already reached the final round by thumping San Diego four games straight.

The playoff for the president's cup and \$5,000 first prize money opens in Seattle Friday night, and will continue through Sunday. The two teams will finish the series at Sacramento next week.

A pair of brilliant pitching performances brought Seattle victory in both games of last night's double-header, when a single defeat would have knocked the Rainiers out of the playoffs. Cole limited Hollywood to three scattered hits in the opener, while Fallon's home run and Niemiec's score on a Star error brought in the winning runs in the second inning.

In the seven-inning nightcap, Barrett yielded only four hits in winning. Gyselman, Rainier third baseman, drove in both runs with singles in the second and fourth innings.

Rudolph Hess Goes On Hunger Strikes

LONDON, Oct. 1—(AP)—Rudolph Hess, former deputy for Adolf Hitler who made a sensational flight to England last May, was reported last night to have started hunger strikes twice in his place of detention in anger because he was being treated as a prisoner of war and not as a "special envoy."

The Star, London evening newspaper, reporting that Hess was being confined "within a very easy distance of London," said he was contending that as an "envoy" he should be allowed to return to Germany at once.

When Hess, then the no. 3 Nazi, flew to Scotland alone early in May in one of the most sensational episodes of the entire war he was reported widely to have brought peace overtures from Hitler.

The Star implied that Hess now was living in comfortable quarters, saying: "Some of our very senior officers who have been captured by the enemy now occupy decent villas. Has Hess a villa or something better suited to his high rank?"

Heroic Canadian Yields His Life to Save Mates Asea

REYKJAVIK, Iceland, Oct. 1—(AP)—The wooden-legged master of the torpedoed freighter Pink Star told today a story of self-sacrificing heroism by the Canadian second officer, J. L. (Jim) Cassidy, who gave up his life so as not to overcrowd a lifeboat.

"Cassidy swam up to our only lifeboat. He saw that it was full, waved goodbye and swam away. We never saw him again," said Captain J. C. Mackenzie.

He looked around at the grim faces of his 23 fellow survivors of the crew of 36. No one said a word. You could hear the wind beating against the side of the Icelandic hut where this tense interview was granted.

(The state department announced Sept. 23 that the survivors, none Americans, had been landed in good shape at Reykjavik.

(The Pink Star, under the flag of Panama after the United States took her into protective custody—she formerly was the 4,150-ton Danish motorship Lundby—was the first ship under American control to be sunk after President Roosevelt's shoot-on-sight speech of Sept. 11.

Nazis, Allies Suffer Big Losses in Drive on Reds

southeast of Kharkov, where Peter the Great routed the Swedish invaders of Charles XII in 1709, declared that soviet troops were forming along the east bank of the Vorskla river to block the Nazi onslaught toward Kharkov.

Capture of Poltava, a city of 150,000 on the west bank of the Vorskla river, was acknowledged in the red army's morning bulletin. The Germans said it fell along with Kiev, the Ukraine capital, on September 19.

Soviet officials reported that large-scale fighting raged with unabating fury at the gateway to the Crimea peninsula. Advances reaching London said German assault troops had reached a point about seven miles south of Perekop, a city at the top of the Crimean isthmus, where the Russians have taken a stand behind extensive minefields.

Nazi Losses Reported

On the northern front aside from reporting a vast slaughter of German siege forces, the Russians said their red armies had recaptured several towns on Leningrad's approaches and routed two more Nazi regiments.

Red Star said German losses in material in the 10-week-old battle for Leningrad included 400 tanks, 846 planes, 300 mine-throwers, 700 machine-guns, 117 armored cars and 200 field guns.

Berlin said German artillery again shelled important industrial facilities in Leningrad "with good effect," while Nazi high command reported the destruction of 45 out of 80 soviet tanks in a clash with a German armored division.

A Russian spokesman acknowledged that Leningrad was still in grave danger, but declared that the German failure to capture the old czarist capital after long weeks of assault constituted "one of the greatest defeats of Hitler's war strategy."

Germany's Finnish allies, driving down on Leningrad from the north reported the capture of Petrozavodsk on the Leningrad-Murmansk railway. The city is 180 miles airline northeast of Leningrad.

English Cities Blasted

In the war in the air, German bombers smashed anew at the British isles during the night, attacking five cities within a few hours after prime minister Churchill had told parliament that the reich was suffering "a very serious shortage" in planes.

Nazi pilots said 13 fires were left raging in Newcastle, English east coast shipbuilding center and that heavy attacks also fell upon Ramsgate, Ayrshire. Hull and various airports. The British reported "considerable damage" and some casualties.

The German said large numbers of RAF bombers raided German coastal cities overnight, killing and wounding an unspecified

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number of civilians, and reported that an aerial thrust against Berlin was frustrated.

London said RAF bombers smashed at the German ports of Hamburg and Stettin and the docks of Nazi-occupied Cherbourg during the night, and that strong formations of fighters and bombers roared over the channel toward Dunkerque and Calais in renewed daylight attacks.

Revolts Harry Nazis

Behind the battle lines, Germany's troubles with conquered nations continued.

A British broadcast quoted a secret Czech radio as having urgently called for a general strike "as a protest against the Nazi oppression."

In Berlin, it was announced that German retaliation for Czech attempts to overthrow Nazi rule had cost 88 lives in three days, with 58 shot yesterday.

Reports from Sofia, Bulgaria, said 543 persons had been arrested at the Black Sea port of Varna in a house-to-house roundup—apparently in quest of soviet agents who were said to have landed by parachute in Bulgaria recently.

U. S. Supplies Reach Egypt

Both the axis and Britain were girding for action in the middle east but there was no indication either side was about to loose a general offensive immediately.

War materials from the United States were being unloaded in Egypt in such quantities that the docks were crowded. These supplies finally will go to the western desert of Egypt, where the British now have more strength than ever, and to the northern defense line on the Turkish frontier, Cairo reports said.

In Rome, the newspaper Il Popolo Di Roma said the Italians were ready for a new British offensive on the north African front having sent to Africa men, material, tanks and planes to "face any eventuality."

Permanent Peace Goal Allies' Aim, Knox Says

lantic fleet's orders became effective Sept. 16, although Knox promised then that "we'll tell the world" if any encounters occurred.

There was food for speculation, too, in the mention Knox made of Japan when he talked of ultimate axis defeat. In recent months President Roosevelt and any other key administration officials have omitted references to Tokyo in denouncing the axis, and not long ago a series of conversations began between the two countries on outstanding differences. But the secretary had this to say:

Nazis' Defeat Not Doubted

"That nazism will be defeated, I have no doubt."

"That we shall proceed from one measure to another measure until we have taken adequate steps to bring defeat to the legions of Hitler and his satellites in Italy and Japan, again I have no doubt."

Knox cautioned against "any Maginot line complex... the error of defensive thinking," particularly with regard to the seaborne defenses of the United States.

"The best defense has always been a swift offense," he said, "and a navy is inherently an instrument for offensive action because of its mobility."

U. S. Can't Avoid Action

Discussing the Anglo-American pooling of the world he foresaw for the future, Knox declared: "You may say: What business is it of ours to police the seven seas? Why should we provide both the leadership and the major force to insure against another world war?"

"My answer is history-made. Twice we have learned from bitter experience that no matter how great our reluctance to participate, the world has now grown so small, so interrelated, so interdependent, that, try as we will, we cannot escape."

"This does not mean we must

fight every time there is a disturbance in the world, but it does mean that the great law-abiding peace-loving nations must take the power into their hands and keep it there for a long time to come to prevent the inauguration of another world war...

Power Imperative

"We will not indulge in any idle dreams of a millennium. We are not going to stop all wars. But I am convinced we, for our own safety and protection, and for the maintenance of our way of life, shall have to provide an interregnum in which we shall not only devote ourselves to the pursuit of peaceful aims, but provide the essential might to enforce such a peace on those who are not willing voluntarily to pursue such a course."

Knox made it clear that he believed sea power would be the major law-enforcement agency for such a policy. "It is the hope of the world," he said, "that sea power for the next hundred years, at least, will reside in the hands of the two great nations which now possess that power—the United States and Great Britain."

cent wage increases. There are 1,800 separate wage classifications, ranging from \$20 to \$180 a month. The hotels made no effort to operate, and turned away persons seeking rooms.

Washington, D. C., hotel operators faced the threat of a similar walkout. Three thousand employees of 16 leading hotels declared they would strike at midnight tonight unless their wage demands were met.

A delegation of striking Pennsylvania hard coal miners conferred at Washington yesterday with John L. Lewis, president of the CIO United Mine Workers, but apparently made no headway toward settling their dispute. More than 20,000 anthracite miners have been idle in recent weeks protesting increased union

dues and assessments.

HEARING STAYS STATED OREGON LUMBER STRIKE

EUGENE, Oct. 1—(AP)—Approximately 2500 Willamette valley AFL lumber and sawmill workers postponed today a scheduled strike.

The strike, set for this morning, will be delayed until a U. S. conciliation commission submits recommendations on wages and working conditions, D. F. Pearson, district union secretary, said.

Jessie E. Jacobson, Seattle, conciliation commissioner, arrived last night to begin a fact-finding survey.

The union had demanded a minimum wage of 75 cents an hour and a week's paid vacation.

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
