

R. H. S. Indians in Fine Condition for Reedsport Clash

Roseburg high school's football squad, comprised of two complete elevens, is in good physical condition for its second seasonal battle, slated against Reedsport high on the latter's field next Saturday. Both teams were used by Coach Jim Davis in the initial game here last Friday against Sweet Home and all of the players emerged from the smashing 28-6 victory without injury.

Equally good fortune has beset the Indians during their workouts so far this week, which has consisted chiefly of defensive line play, to correct noticeable faults. The improvement as a whole in the work of the squad, coupled with its sound condition and fighting spirit, bases Coach Davis' prediction of a second triumph for his warriors when they clash

with Reedsport. In games thus far this season, Reedsport has walloped Florence 18-0 and lost to Springfield 13-6.

Social Security Program Expansion Is Planned

WASHINGTON, Oct. 1 (AP)—President Roosevelt disclosed yesterday that the administration was contemplating a broad expansion of the social security program with the two-fold objective of deterring inflation and easing readjustment after the current emergency ends.

He told a press conference that he probably would submit to congress soon a message on the matter and that perhaps the number of persons to be brought under social security would be doubled.

On a guess, he said, the number might be increased from forty to eighty million persons.

He said, too, that it might be necessary to boost payroll taxes.

The chief executive, who had considered the social security problem earlier in the day with a group of government officials, said it was desired to make coverage as wide as possible and also to give federal aid to poorer states.

For jelly making, concord grapes are best. All blue grapes, however, are NOT concord. Be sure you get concord when you ask for concord because other grapes take a different recipe.

Wash and crush about 2 1/2 lbs. fully ripe grapes. Add 1 1/2 cups water and simmer, covered 10 minutes. Squeeze out juice. For concord juice use the following proportions:

5 cups concord juice

Civil Service Opens Batch Of Jobs to Examination

The civil service commission has announced an examination for positions as specialist in maternal and child health. The salaries range from \$3,200 to \$5,600 a year. Positions in the children's bureau, department of labor, will be filled from these examinations, and vacancies in state agencies cooperating with the children's bureau may also be filled at the request of the states. Applicants must have been graduated from a medical school of recognized standing, with the degree of M. D., and must have served one year of internship. In addition they must have had full-time post-internship clinical training as well as other appropriate experience in one of the options. Applications must be filed at the commission's Washington office not later than November 15, 1941.

Qualified persons are asked to apply for positions of inspector, engineering materials (aeronautical); toolmaker, machinist, and project auditor.

Full information as to the requirements for these examinations and application forms may be obtained from C. B. Calkins, secretary of the local service board, at the postoffice building in this city.

Refrigerator Output Cut Ordered by Govt.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 1.—(AP)—The government ordered makers of household mechanical refrigerators yesterday to cut production for the last five months of 1941 to a level 43.2 per cent under average monthly output for the year which ended June 30, and warned that cuts in 1942 "will probably be greater."

Thirty factories employing 45,

000 workers will feel the curtailment imposed by Priorities Director Donald M. Nelson as a means of conserving steel and other strategic materials for defense needs.

It was the second drastic cut imposed on an industry producing durable consumer goods. Automobile production for December recently was cut 48.4 per cent, and similar limitations are expected soon for washing machines, household irons, vacuum cleaners and other items.
