

Cochrane Wallops Jenkins; Simon, Thompson Draw

NEW YORK, Oct. 7 (AP)—Welterweight Champ Freddie (Red) Cochrane gave Lightweight Boss Lew Jenkins a flailing for ten rounds last night, while Len back-pedaled and ran away.

Cochrane walked out against the fellow who was supposed to be among the greatest punching lightweights in ring history and chased him all over the place. He floored him five times, using both hands to do it, and at the end of the only round he had lost was the third, which was taken from him for low punching. The decision for Cochrane was a mere formality.

He had no more opposition than a truck going through a paper wall. Jenkins didn't take a single forward step, and actually threw fewer than a dozen punches.

Jenkins said he was still ailing from his motorcycle accident three weeks ago and that a chiropractor had treated his back only three days ago, but that it's his first righthand punch had done all the treatment.

Simon Gets Unpopular

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 7 (AP)—Gargantuan Abe Simon of New York and Turkey Thompson, Los Angeles negro heavyweight, fought a 10-round draw at the Hollywood ball park last night.

Referee Benny Whitman's decision brought little favor from home town backers of Thompson. Outweighed 69½ pounds—Simon 256, Thompson 186½—the 21-year-old negro was not outfought by the six foot-four easterner, who towered head and shoulders above him.

Thompson landed the harder blows, and in the ninth staggered big Abe with four hard smashes to the head. He ran out of gas, however, and Simon finished strongly.

Simon hurt his right hand in the second.

HONOLULU, Oct. 7 (AP)—Rush Dalma of Manila, bantam-weight champion of the Orient, punched out a headline decision over Lou Salica of New York, world bantam king, in a non-title 10-round fight here last night. Each weighed 119½.

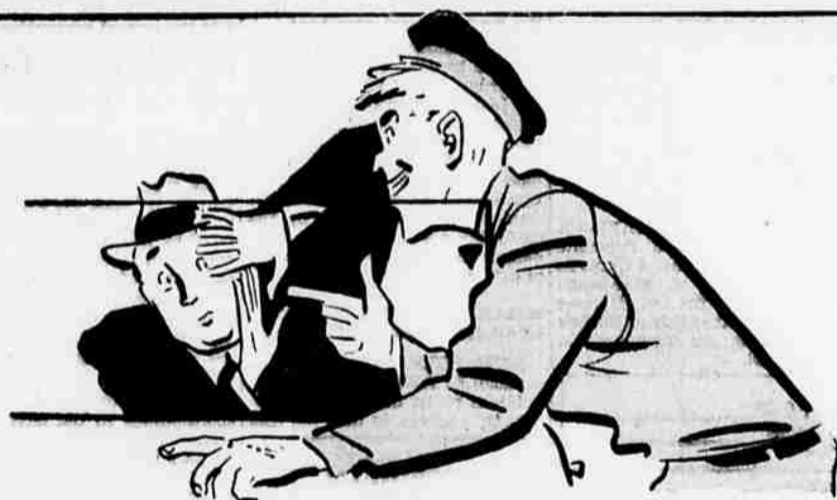
