Elias' Penalty Suspended

DNB, the official German news agency, said the death sentence imposed on Premier General Alois Elias of the Nazi Bohemia-Moravia protectorate (in old Czechoslovakia) for "premeditated treason" had been suspended to permit him to testify against other suspects.

A Berlin spokesman declined to comment as to whether Elias had made a plea for mercy to Hitler, the only person who can commute his sentence.

The Germans denied British radio reports that 650 German hostages were being held by guerrillas in Yugoslavia.

was revived.

Mrs. Maggie Sutton suffered a broken back as the twister lifted

her house away. Three of her five children were blown away. Rescuers found them hours later, none injured seriously.

A torrential rain soaked the entire city, but outside the immediate tornado area there were either light winds or a calm.

The storm appeared to bounce, damaging several blocks at one point, then skipping over an entire neighborhood before striking again.

It left many freakish ruins. The new Arlington Methodist church was wrecked, except for the front quarter which was intact. Near the Kay-See mill company, east side of the Union Wire and Rope company's plant was sliced off.

A terrific storm with steady winds of 73 miles an hour and gusts up to 80 miles smashed through the city August 25 causing huge property damage. Only minor injuries resulted from that blow.

STORRS, Conn., Oct. 7.—(AP)—A pen of 13 white Leghorn hens from Corvallis, Ore., were believed by University of Connecticut authorities today to be egg-laying champions of the United States and Canada.

The hens, owned by J. A. Hanson, led all breeds in the 30th Storrs egg laying contest, just completed, for the second year in a row. They produced a total of 3,964 eggs and 4,241.60 points, including weight.

The university said reports from other contests failed to equal these figures.
