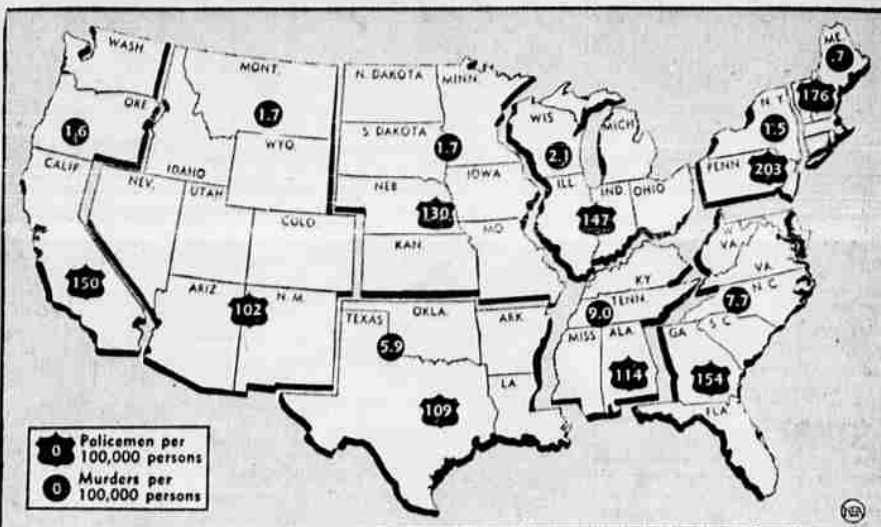

EVERETT, Wash., Oct. 8.—(AP)—Lester G. Williams, 43, Everett hospital orderly, was being held at the county jail here today for questioning in connection with the fatal shooting last night of Fay Heath, 28, Mukilteo, and the wounding of Mrs. Marian Williams, 38, divorced wife of the prisoner.

Heath was shot through the heart as he drove up to Mrs. Williams' home at Mukilteo in his roadster, Mrs. Williams, coming to the door of her home upon hearing the report of the gun, was shot in the leg. According to Sheriff Ryan and Prosecutor Cooper, who investigated, Williams admitted the shooting, stating that it was he who had had the officers notified.
