Mr. Miller died August 17, 1924.

CHICAGO, Oct. 9.—(AP)—Helen Morgan, 41, whose name was synonymous with tearful love ballads ever since she starred in Flo Ziegfeld's "Show Boat" 15 years ago, died last night, following an operation September 25 for removal of the spleen.

Her husband, Lloyd Johnson, wealthy Los Angeles automobile dealer whom she married July 27, and her mother, Mrs. Lulu Morgan of High Falls, N. Y., were at her bedside when she died.

Miss Morgan, a Danville, Ill., girl who once clerked in a Chicago department store, climbed atop a piano to sing her way to fame in the fabulous 1920's, years of free spending, extravagant theatrical productions, speakeasies and night clubs.
