

Stanford, O. S. C. Billed; Trojans Take on U. of O.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 10.—(AP)—Stanford, with all the other Rose Bowl specials sidetracked, runs into the threat of derailment itself tomorrow in its drive for a second straight Pacific coast conference football crown.

The "Formation Indians," only undefeated conference team after two weeks of action, tangle with the giant-killing Oregon State Beavers at Corvallis. The Beavers last week knocked over Washington, pre-season title choice, and figure to give Stanford one of its toughest battles.

The contest tops a heavy week-end of important football attractions for the far west. Montana leads off the action tonight against an uncertain U. C. L. A. club at Los Angeles, and Texas Tech clashes with Loyola in an inter-sectional night game at Los Angeles.

Washington travels to Pullman to meet Washington State in the top billing of the conference games Saturday. The Huskies, dumped by Minnesota and Oregon State, are no better than an even shot over the WSC outfit that pricked California's Rose Bowl bubble last week.

Dark horse Oregon, still a contender despite its opening loss to Stanford, takes on the stumbling Southern California Trojans at Los Angeles. U. S. C. will be back at full strength again after its thumping by Ohio State, but the Webfoots looked very powerful in both starts this season.

The largest crowd of the week, over 65,000, is expected to watch California and Santa Clara renew their rivalry at Berkeley after four years. The Bears, stunned by the loss of star halfback Jim Jurkovich, expect plenty of trouble from hard-hitting Santa Clara.

In other western games, Idaho takes on Gonzaga at Spokane tonight. On Sunday, St. Mary's and University of San Francisco play at San Francisco.

Seattle, Sactos Face 7th Game for Series Verdict

SACRAMENTO, Oct. 10.—(AP)—Seattle and Sacramento wind up a tight battle for the Coast league president's cup tonight, as they clash in the deciding contest of the seven-game play off series. The champion Rainiers nipped Sacramento 4 to 3 last night to square the series at three games each. The victory snapped a three-game winning streak, and kept Seattle in the running when one more loss would have given Sacramento the cup and first prize money.

Seattle pounded Schmidt for three runs in the third inning with White's triple doing most of the damage. The Rainiers added the winning tally in the fifth, with Harris driving White in with a single. Webber, Seattle hurler, held the Sactos to five safeties.

The Solons came back in the sixth, scoring two runs on a pair of Seattle errors, but didn't threaten after that.

California's Ban On Indigents Challenged

WASHINGTON, Oct. 9.—(AP)—Challenging the constitutionality of a California law prohibiting anyone from assisting non-resident indigent persons to enter the state, a house committee told the supreme court today that both labor and capital should be permitted to move throughout the nation "freely" unharassed and with the maximum amount of facility.

The brief was presented by Representative Tolson (D., Cal.) on behalf of a committee investigating the interstate migration of destitute citizens.

Twenty-seven other states were said to have similar laws.

Dom DiMaggio Sued by Man Struck by Bat

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 9.—(AP)—Dominic DiMaggio, Boston Red Sox baseball player, has been sued for \$11,600 damages by Joseph W. Rodgers, Long Beach oil supply company executive, for injuries he charges he received at an exhibition baseball game at Wrigley field here last October. Rodgers alleged he suffered concussion and other injuries when DiMaggio's bat slipped from his hands and flew into the grandstand.

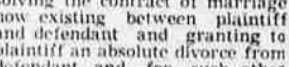

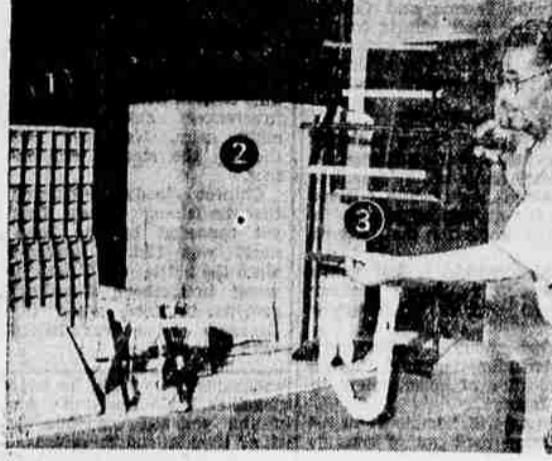

Grow Your Own Stockings



Solution to silk shortage offered by William Vandrasak of Chicago is to grow your own. Process begins in cardboard box incubator (1) where eggs are hatched into silkworms. These are placed in egg crate compartments (2) to feed on mulberry leaves and make cocoons. Then Vandrasak unwinds cocoons and reels up skein of silk (3) formed by 110 of them.

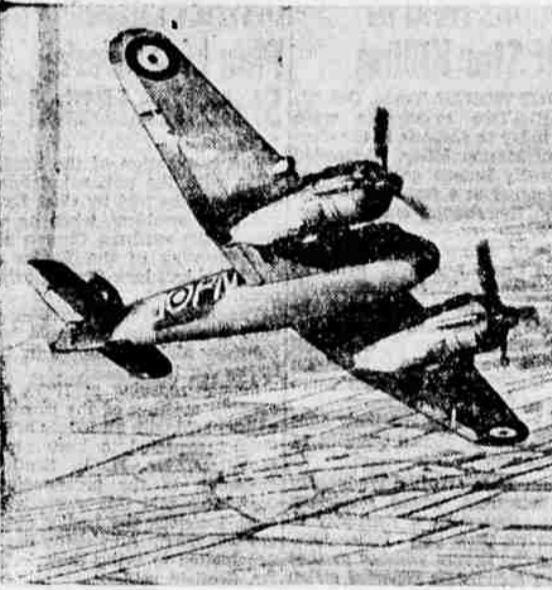
