ment on operations at the Fair-plant, which produces most of the plates and structural shapes used in gulf coast ship-building operations.

The plant employs more than 11,000 of the 31,000 TCI workers and is the largest steel manufacturing unit in the south.

A proposed settlement of a strike of 200 Portland AFL upholsterers was rejected here yesterday.

Harold P. Cook, union secretary, said the plant, similar to one accepted Monday at Tacoma, failed to increase wages of men in the lower brackets. The men are on strike at six local plants.

In Brooklyn, N. Y., 5,800 employees of Robins drydock walked out at noon today to protest, union leaders said, the employ-

ment of six non-union workers at the shipyard which is busy repairing both American and British ships. Company officials refused to comment on the walk-out, staged by local 39 of the Industrial Union of Marine and Shipbuilding Workers of America (CIO).

Mike Lillis, Beloved Portland Cop, Passes

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 10.—(AP)—Mike Lillis, who was born on Christmas day and lived to transform, almost single-handed, Portland's Albina district from the toughest to one of the best-behaved, died yesterday.

He was a 60-year-old police patrolman, oldest in point of service on the force, when he fell dead of a heart attack.

Albina kids for generations were his pals. It was he who led the campaign that finally got them a playground. After years of struggle, he got business interests to underwrite a community center.

Hallow'en in Albina used to be a black night of destruction. But Lillis, friend of the roving gangs, talked them into attending his apple-and-cider party. They generally obeyed his injunction to go straight home after it.

Although the navy is known to have a great many guns in reserve which were adequate to protect ships against submarines, there was a shortage of anti-aircraft weapons.

tial vote could be mustered against the ship arming proposal in the house, administration forces in the senate were likely to seek more sweeping changes, which would end the curb on ship movements.

"There are some who believe that the arming of ships might not be so bad in itself," Taft told reporters, "but when it is linked with a proposal to send those ships into the war zone, the whole question must be considered."

Administration bills introduced in both houses called only for repeal of the prohibition against the arming of ships, and some legislators said that was as far as they wished to go.

Merchants plying the Atlantic danger zones can be armed just as soon as Congress gives the word, administration leaders disclosed today, because the navy has sufficiently overcome the serious shortage of proper weapons which existed earlier this year.

"There will be enough guns for the ships in the Atlantic as soon as the necessary revision of the neutrality act is accomplished," an informed administration source said.

WOOL

BOSTON, Oct. 10.—(AP)—The Commercial Bulletin will say tomorrow:

"Trading in wool in the seaboard markets this week has been slow and spotty but prices are firmly maintained. In the west, about five million pounds of wool have been moved, chiefly in Texas, New Mexico and Wyoming at firm rates. A little wool has been sold in the bright wool states at 1 to 1 1/2 cents less than a week ago.

"Foreign markets are very firm, with fair purchases for this market. Purchases of wool for this country in Australia to September 30 are officially reported at 179,564 bales.

"The piecegoods market is overshadowed by government purchases. Brigadier General C. S. Corbin, assistant quartermaster general of the United States, states to the wool editor of the commercial bulletin that the wool goods program of the government is well in hand; that all the blankets necessary for the current fiscal year have been procured

and that further quantities of supplementary fabrics for the balance of the year will be announced probably before the first of the year, although recent rumors of 25 million yards or more are exaggerated.

"General Corbin also stated that the supply of wool in the hands of the industry at the present time are sufficient to carry us through to the end of 1942 without further importations, at the present rate of consumption. He recommended the entire wool industry for the manner in which it has supported the government program and at the same time restrained prices."
