## MRS. IVAN PICKENS TO INSTRUCT SECOND HOME NURSING RED CROSS CLASS

The registrations for the home nursing course to be sponsored by the American Red Cross and opening today at the Red Cross rooms in the bank building has been so great, that the class will be divided and a second class formed next week.

There will still be room for nine more registrations for this second class, which will be instructed by Mrs. Ivan Pickens, one of Roseburg's most prominent young matrons. Mrs. Pickens received her nurses training at St. Luke's hospital in Aberdeen, South Dakota, and is a registered nurse in Oregon, as well as South Dakota. She has been a resident of Roseburg for the last 13 years and before her marriage, was a nurse at Mercy hospital. Mrs. Pickens has an exceptionally fine personality and the Red Cross chapter here has announced it feels especially fortunate in obtaining the trained services of instructors such as Mrs. Pickens and Mrs. Grant H. Moore, who will teach the home nursing class, which opens today.

Only 24 registrations can be taken for a class, so the class, which meets today with a registration of 39, will be divided and the meeting day of Mrs. Pickens' class will be announced tomorrow. Those taking the course are asked to bring a notebook and pencil. Upon completion of the course, which will close the first week in December, the group will take an examination and those passing will receive a certificate of award from the Red Cross. This certificate will not entail any responsibilities on the part of those taking the course. It is simply a course given to train women in the home to take care of persons who are ill and what to do in cases of emergency. The course is sponsored by the Red Cross for the purpose of training the women in the home in case of a shortage of doctors in various towns and cities during wartime. The women will not be subject to call for having taken the course.

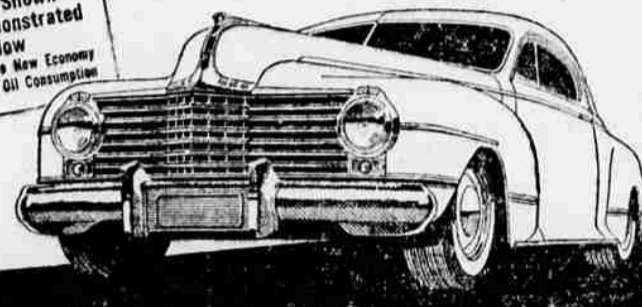
