

Indians Drilling Hard for Tilt With University High

The Roseburg Indians are pointing with great enthusiasm towards the game to be played on Friday night against University high of Eugene, Coach Jim Davis said today. The rivalry which has existed between the two schools for years is even stronger this season and there is every prospect that fans will see a wide-open game with everything in the book used in at-

tempts by both teams to win, Davis declares.

Gerald Denny, who suffered a back injury in the Reedsport game, has fully recovered and will be in the starting line-up Friday night, Davis reports. Denny plays in a guard position on defense and at the end on offense. Defense Drill Stressed.

Big Duck Increase Awaiting Hunters

The duck shooting season opens at sunrise tomorrow in California and 24 other states, and reports from observation posts the length of the Pacific slope bear out official predictions that if there is any shortage, it will be only in space for hunters.

Ponds are black with ducks and stubble fields already dotted with cacklers and honkers southward bound from the Canadian marshes, where the U. S. biological survey says their increase this summer far exceeded that of any recent year.

Field observers in California's four principal hunting areas, moreover, have noted that the flights predominate in sprig and mallard, big birds which will weigh a hunter down if he bags his limit and go far towards keeping the butcher from the kitchen door.

Water abounds in most of the hunting zones, and feed, the lure which brings the migrants out of the skies, appears generally plentiful.

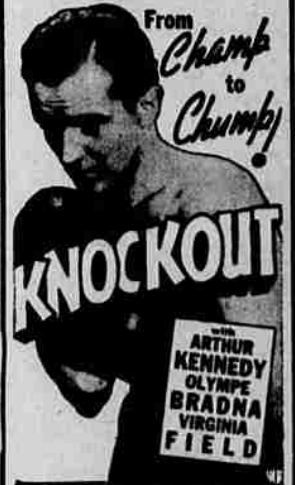
