

R. H. S. Students Ignore Warning, Touch Off Bonfire

Deed Brings Cancellation of Football Rally Started To Precede Game Tomorrow

An over-abundance of spirit on the part of some of the students at Roseburg high school caused cancellation today of the football rally and bonfire originally scheduled for tonight.

In an effort to prevent recurrence of roughhouse battles between upper and lower classmen, school authorities yesterday issued warning that further activities would result in cancellation of the bonfire rally, but despite the warning, upper classmen succeeded last night in touching off the bonfire and as a result the school authorities ordered the cancellation.

A minor battle occurred Wednesday while sophomores were collecting material for the bonfire, one of the students suffering a mild cut on the hand in attempting to wrest a can of gasoline from the upper classmen. Fearing more serious injury in the event of further encounters in the customary attempt of the upper classmen to burn the bonfire ahead of the scheduled time, school authorities warned that no more roughhouse tactics would be tolerated and that should the bonfire be touched off during the night there would be no rally.

"Soph" Guards Ignored. Although sophomores guarded the pile last night, they obeyed instructions of school authorities and offered no physical resistance when upper classmen appeared and tossed firebrands into the pile about 11 p. m.

The guards refused to reveal the identity of the students igniting the bonfire, but the student council was reported to be investigating and it was anticipated student punishment would be given the offenders in the event they were identified.

The students today were promised a "pep assembly" which will be held in the school auditorium Friday, preceding the game Friday night between the Roseburg and University high school ("Eugene") football teams.

The game is one of the principal contests each year, as great rivalry exists between the two schools. Local fans are assured of plenty of excitement in connection with the meeting of the two football squads.

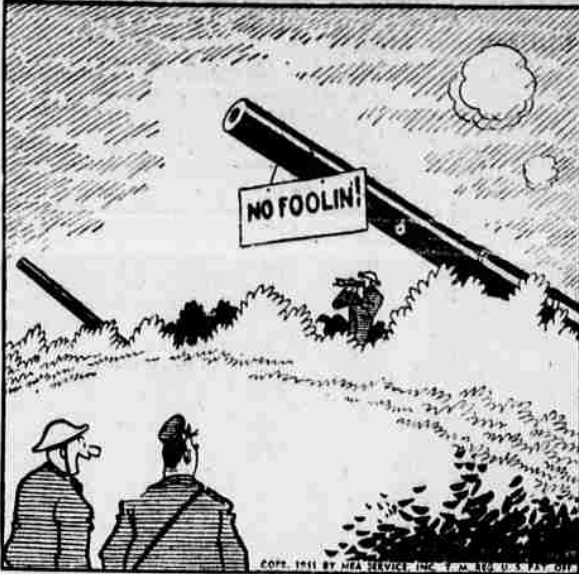

Teen Age Trio Held In Trek Slaying

PORTLAND, Me., Oct. 16.—(AP)—Police held for "safe keeping" today an Alexandria, Va., teen-aged trio—a boy and two girls—after the boy tearfully related, Assistant County Attorney Richard S. Chapman said, of having slain in Maryland Monday a 38-year-old man who had made advances to one of the girls.

The three were identified on police records as: Herbert H. Cox, Jr., 16; Ida May Price, 15, and Leona Ellen Cunningham, 14.

The dead man, described by the youths merely as "Browning," had offered to give the three a ride after they had decided to run away from their trailer-camp homes in Alexandria, Chapman said they told him.

Striking Students Denied Use of School Building

LA CENTER, Wash., Oct. 16.—(AP)—Forty-five striking La Center high school students hoped to present their case tonight, but the school board indicated it would ignore their request for a hearing.

The strike came as the latest development in the dismissal of Superintendent E. Rutherford last April.

Student body president Robert Pye said it was not a reflection on the new superintendent, John Rutherford, but that "we want Mr. Rutherford back."

Rutherford, superintendent for 10 years, recently obtained a mandamus writ to force payment of his July salary warrant. C. R. Barnhart, school board clerk, said the strikers would be denied the school building to present their version to the board, parents and students.
