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Dual Citizenship

It would probably be a fine thing if the world were such that national borders could be less rigid than they are. A man is first of all a man, a member of the human race, and there should be no finer title than that of "citizen of the world."

Some day this may come. It has not come as yet. For the past 50 years the tendency has been the other way, toward raising and tightening the barriers between one country and another.

It would be plain suicide for any country, in this world of ultra-nationalism, run riot, to let down those barriers when others will not. And to allow breaches in our own barriers to be regularly used as channels for flooding subversive influences into the country is simply stupid.

Most Americans probably do not know even the meaning of the term "dual citizenship." In our simplicity, we always assume that to be a citizen of our country means undivided loyalty to this country and to this country alone. Because Americans generally have this simple, uncomplicated view of the matter, very few of them ever become naturalized citizens of another country. They feel the finality of the step, knowing that they would render the same undivided loyalty to a new country that they paid to their own.

Not all countries or people take this view. There are several countries recognizing "dual citizenship." That is, they permit their nationals to go to another country and become citizens there, yet retaining a claim on their loyalty to the homeland. Many people of Japanese, German and Italian origin, for instance, are dual citizens of this country and of their homeland. Germans coming to Mexico, and other Latin countries, freely take out citizenship there, never assuming for an instant that this alters their relationship to the homeland.

Secretary of War Stimson has proposed legislation to eliminate complications arising from such "dual citizenship." He says he has evidence that advantages gained by such a system have been used to facilitate spy work. His bill would provide that any national considered under the laws of another country to be a subject of that other country may be required to appear before a U. S. commissioner and either renounce United States citizenship or formally renounce any allegiance elsewhere. Refusal would subject the national to deportation.

As long as national citizenship is a recognized and apparently necessary institution, it must mean all or nothing. Other countries may tolerate or even encourage in their laws such divided loyalties. There is no room for them here. American citizenship either means undivided and unreserved loyalty to America, or it means nothing at all. This bill is worth congress' earnest attention.

bootleg sources. This writer can't say as to that, not having had time for such illicit ventures. They are certainly not on display.)

TO an American, English cigarettes are vile. They are also relatively expensive, the com-

moner brands running about 25 cents for a package of 18. They are sold usually in cardboard boxes, rather than paper packs. The English make the world's best pipes. Their pipe mixtures are highly esteemed. But they haven't yet acquired the knack of making cigarettes that an American can smoke except under pressure of necessity. The most widely advertised brand is Sweet Caporals, which will be remembered by Americans of a couple of generations ago.

ALL Canada has the government liquor store system, and there are no public hard liquor bars. The hotels, however, are permitted to operate bars, exactly similar to the American cocktail lounges. They are known as clubs, and the theory seems to be that by registering at the hotel you become a member of the club. They are quiet, sedate and pleasant affairs.

These clubs, in the province of Quebec, at least, are not permitted to operate on Sundays. In order to secure even a portion of beer on Sunday, you are required to order food amounting to 40 cents.

Liquor prices in Canada appear about the same as in the United States—including Scotch.

WHILE on the subject of Canada, they have a new twist on the sightseeing business in Quebec, whose narrow, crooked, one-way streets are calculated to bring strange drivers to a state of collapse in about three blocks. The guides hire out to drive YOUR car and show you the town. After 15 minutes on your own, you're ready to stop in the middle of the street and yell for their help.

SPEAKING from memory, and therefore not guaranteeing accuracy, this writer would say offhand that Oregon and Nevada are about the only states in the Union not levying sales taxes. Practically everywhere else you get a tax tacked onto what you buy and your pockets sag constantly with the weight of pennies. Here and there you get tax tokens as well.

In Canada there is some sort of sales tax which no American traveler has yet been able to fathom and in addition there is a five per cent hospital tax levied by the hotels. You come to feel in the course of a reasonably extended jaunt that you are a citizen of every state and every province. At least you've paid taxes in most of them.

FROM the Midwest on, you do your bit in paying for every bridge built since Washington had to ferry over the Delaware. Some of them look old enough to be falling down a la London Bridge, but you pay your toll just the same.

Out West we're accustomed to paying for the privilege of crossing big bridges, especially those of us in Southern Oregon and Northern California who go often to San Francisco. But back East you pungle up to cross about every creek too wide to jump over.

You get in a little while so you reach for your change pocket every time you see a bridge of any sort looming ahead of you. The tariff runs from two to four bits a crack.

The Canadians are particularly adept at collecting bridge tolls. To leave Quebec and get into and out of Montreal, a distance of about 200 miles, costs three bucks Canadian.

You pay a half dollar to cross streams you could throw a Hereford calf over without straining yourself.
