Indians Expect Hard Battle With Springfield's 11

The Roseburg High school Indians were scheduled only for limbering up exercises and light workouts today as they prepared to meet Springfield high school Friday night at Finlay field. The team was expected to get a "skull practice" session tonight as they review plays and strategy and outlined the defense against the Springfield Millers.

The game, scheduled to start at 8 p. m., is expected to be a very exciting contest, particularly if the field remains dry and fast. The Indians have shown an exceptionally strong passing attack this year, and have used a great deal of open style play on offense, which makes the game far more interesting from the standpoint of spectators.

The Millers also use a passing game, coupled with a good deal of power in their running attack. Springfield is reported to have a very strong line, as compared with a comparatively weak line as displayed so far this season by the Indians, so that the game may settle down to a display of power on the one hand and speed, deception and passing on the other.

Regardless of the outcome of the game, local fans are expected to see a most interesting game.
