## The largest monthly total was \$248,440 in December, 1937.

Jerrold Owen, commission secretary, said the increase was caused by many persons repaying their loans to avoid interest, and by others refinancing their loans through federal agencies.

In their present condition men are like bees which have just swarmed and are hanging down a limb in a cluster. The position of the bees is temporary and must inevitably be changed. They must rise and find a new home for themselves. Every one of the bees knows that and wishes to change the position and that of the others, but not one is able to do so before the others do so too. They cannot rise all at once, because one hangs down from the other, keeping it from separating itself from the swarm, and so all continue to hang. It would seem that the bees could not get out of this state, just as it seems to worldly men who are entangled in the snare of the social world conception. But there would be no way out for the bees, if each of the bees were not separately a living being, endowed with wings. So there would be no way out for men, if each of them were not a separate living being, endowed with the ability of acquiring the Christian concept of life. The individual and the kingdom of God is like the bees. So long as the first, second, hundredth bee does not unfold its wings and fly, the swarm, too, will not fly away, or find new life. ## U. S.-British Help Promised Stalin

LONDON, Oct. 23.—(AP)—Lord Beaverbrook told the House of Lords today that the United States and British missions to Russia had promised Joseph Stalin to make up Russia's losses in tanks and planes in the war against Germany by shipments from their two countries.

Beaverbrook, minister of supply and head of the British war aid mission to Moscow, declared that Russia had lost textile, munitions and heavy machinery industries of great value and compared the U. S. S. R.'s position to that of Britain after Dunkerque.

He declared bluntly that the situation in Russia was grave despite the development of many moveable industries. He said Stalin described them as "leap frog industries which could be moved backwards for forwards as the enemy advanced or retreated."

"They have steel plants and heavy engineering works 900 miles or more from the German line of advance," Lord Beaverbrook said, "and these are capable of immense production."

Speakers at the same time were telling the House of Commons that the people of Britain were "ready to face grave risks for Russia" that many felt not enough was being done.
