retained. These sections include those preventing foreign countries from raising money in the United States, forbidding the use of the American flag by foreign ships and granting the government control over munitions exports.

Guesses were many and varied as to how long the senate would debate the legislation, and Senator Nye told reporters:

"If the question is limited to arming ships, then I think the senate would act within a week. If it is broader than that, then there's going to be warfare in the senate. I would think it would be an issue on which almost 96 senators would want to speak, because it may be the last chance to debate the issue of peace or war."

Declaring that "a substantial vote" would be recorded against the single issue of ship arming, Nye added that "if they (the administration) go beyond that the most they can hope for is victory by a narrow margin."

dar of attempting to threaten Japan," said Chugal. "We have to be very careful with the United States attitude, as threatening and appealing arguments go on side by side in order to work out a clever plot."

Domel quoted an unofficial but well informed source, meanwhile, as saying that the serious situation to which Knox referred was caused by the United States' own actions toward Japan.

Japan, this source declared, has done all in her power to preserve peace.

Such utterances as that of the United States secretary of the

navy, he said, do not smooth the source of Japanese-American discussions, and the outcome of the talks is up to the United States.
