CHURCHILL ALSO SCORES EXECUTION OF HOSTAGES

LONDON, Oct. 25.—(AP)—Prime Minister Churchill, associating the British government with President Roosevelt's declaration on German reprisal executions in Europe, said today that "retribution for these crimes must henceforth take its place among the major purposes of the war." He declared in a press statement that Nazi "butcheries" in the occupied countries were "but a forerunner of what Hitler would inflict upon the British and American people if only he could get the power."

"These cold-blooded executions of innocent people will only recoil upon the savages who order and execute them."
