RANKIN ACADEMY PLANE CRASH KILLS TWO MEN

TULARE, Calif., Oct. 29.—(AP)—An army trainer plane crashed and burned near Woodville yesterday, killing two fliers. Second Lieutenant John L. Lothrop, 26, of Santa Monica, Calif., and Aviation Cadet Lawrence E. Riggs, 21, of Rupert, Idaho. A crew of about 50 cotton pick-

ers looked on helplessly while the ship struck and burst into flames in a cotton field, about 8 miles southeast of Tulare. Ted Hopkins, foreman of the crew, was burned on the hands and face as he tried to remove the bodies.

The fliers were practicing forced landings. The motor of the plane sputtered just before the crash, Hopkins said. The trainer ship was from the Rankin Aeronautical academy.

Oregon Marine Shot by Japanese at Peiping

PEIPING, Oct. 29.—(AP)—Japanese police were cooperating today with the United States embassy in a search for an unidentified oriental who fired four pistol shots yesterday at Private Douglas Bunn of Tigard, Ore., United States marine who was on sentry duty at the embassy. Bunn, wounded in one foot, was reported recovering.

The United States embassy, in a protest to the Japanese embassy, charged that the assailant was Japanese, on the basis of a statement Bunn made to Lieut. Col. W. W. Ashurst, commander of the marine guard.

Slayer Dies Tomorrow Unless Sprague Acts

SALEM, Oct. 29.—(AP)—With less than 24 hours before his scheduled execution in the prison gas chamber at 8:30 a. m. tomorrow, James Harvey Thomas, 19, nervously paced his cell today, hoping and praying that Governor Sprague, who has received clemency petitions from the residents of the boy's home town of Holyoke, Colo., has given no indication as to what he would do. But he has spent many hours studying the case during the last few days.

Thomas shot and killed Douglas Smith near Arlington on June 11. Smith, en route from Idaho to his mother's deathbed in Aberdeen, Wash., had picked up Thomas, who was hitch-hiking. Thomas said he killed Smith because he was afraid Smith would report him as a deserter from the navy.

Alleged "Bookie" Ring at Salem Nabbed by Police

SALEM, Oct. 29.—(AP)—Seven persons, accused of operating a ring which accepted bets on horse races and football games, were arrested yesterday by state police who acted on secret grand jury indictments.

A. Warren Jones, former city

police judge, and Frank Rogers, said by state police to be the owner of a Seattle club, were arrested with Mrs. Rogers at a home which police said was headquarters of the organization. Bertha Russell, operator of the Depot hotel, and Leon C. Webb, janitor, were arrested at the hotel, while Charles L. McLin was arrested at the Cozy confectionery, of which he is the owner. At Milwaukie, police arrested John Wrath, Salem.

A Portland bonding house posted \$1,000 bonds for all but Webb and McLin, bonds in these cases being \$500 and \$250, respectively.
