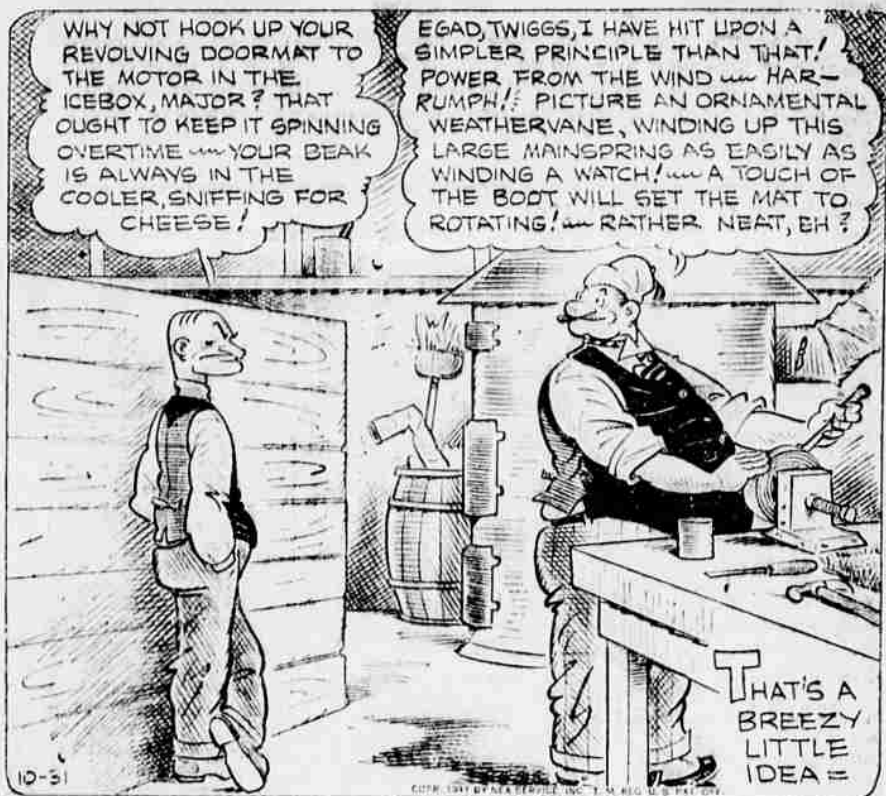


Rich Cattleman Held in Probe Of Girl's Gun Death

FARMINGTON, Me., Oct. 29—(AP)—A diary kept by Florence Buzzell, 20, who Fred Wheeler, 50, wealthy cattleman and father of four children, is charged with slaying, aided authorities in their investigations of her fatal shooting, Attorney General Frank T. Cowan said today.

The pretty secretarial school student had filled several volumes in recent years with descriptions of "her progress in education and her experiences," the attorney stated, adding that the account was complete up to the time of her mysterious death five months ago. He said it contained the

"The state," he declared, "still is following certain information that was contained in the diaries but at the present time the contents are being kept confidential."
State Police Chief Henry Weaver said that Wheeler had financed the girl's schooling at Gates Business college in Augusta and

that he apparently was jealous because another man was "wooing and winning the girl away from him."
Weaver made the statement as he ordered a three-state search that culminated a few hours later last night with the cattleman's arrest in Boston.
The girl's body was found in a garden in Chesterville last June 7, a revolver at its side. A medical examiner reported at the time only that she had been "killed by a bullet."
After a brief flurry of investigation, the case appeared headed for the "unsolved" file and it dropped from public view until the warrant was sworn out last night on the basis of a secret indictment by a grand jury.

Special Session Asked To Equalize Tax Boost

PORTLAND, Oct. 29—(AP)—Gerard Macnamara, Portland, asked Governor Sprague today to call a special session of the legislature to equalize tax increases confronting Multnomah county home-owners.
Macnamara, whose petition for relief to the Multnomah board of equalization became the basis of the state supreme court's recent decision supporting the tax commission's order to boost taxes, asked the special session in the names of "90,000 home-owners of Multnomah county."
He said that the tax commission's order outlawing the variable ration of assessment in use here for 50 years would increase the taxes on a \$5000 home 21 per cent.
"The average American home-owner is violently opposed to suddenly shouldering a heavy additional burden of taxes when the money derived is being used to pass out benefits to other classes of taxpayers," Macnamara said.

Woman Admits Killing Her New-Born Child

SPOKANE, Oct. 29 (AP)—Betty King, 25, Spokane stenographer, Tuesday was charged with second degree murder of an infant son born to her last Saturday in a Spokane apartment bathroom.
Deputy Prosecuting Attorney Leslie Carroll said the young woman had made a complete confession from a hospital bed where she was taken after the baby's body was found Monday in an apartment house garbage chute.
Miss King, in her quoted confession, said she was alone when the child was born and that she killed it with a tack hammer.

Big Game Hunting in Oregon Ends in November
PORTLAND, Oct. 29—(AP)—November will end 1941 big game hunting in Oregon, the state game commission pointed out today.
The eastern Oregon elk season opens Nov. 1 and extends through Nov. 16. Bear hunting is legal throughout November.
Commission investigators say elk are running in large herds and are abundant this season. One elk of either sex is the bag limit and a special elk tag for residents is necessary, costing \$5. Out-of-state hunters must pay \$15 for non-resident hunting licenses and \$25 for non-resident elk tags.
