Bonuses Given Employees Of U. S. National Bank

Seven employees of the Roseburg branch of the U. S. National bank were made happy today when approximately \$300 was received here to be distributed Friday in the form of a bonus to each of them.

The bonus will be given all employees who have had six months or more of service, although a flat sum also will be paid those who have been employed within the last six months providing they have worked at least 60 days.

The bonus, which amounts to approximately 30 per cent of one month's salary, was authorized, bank officials stated, to assist employees in meeting increased living costs, and is in addition to a pay increase authorized last July.

Hearing Scheduled for Alleged Wife Slayer

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 30.—(AP)—Monty J. Illingworth, held here on a fugitive warrant charging him with the murder of his wife in Clallam county, Wash., in 1937, was ordered yesterday to appear November 28 for a hearing before Municipal Judge Walters.

At the request of Illingworth's attorney, a hearing scheduled for today in Governor Olson's office on the accused man's extradition was postponed until Monday.

Illingworth, 33, is formally charged with strangling his wife Hallie, 39, wrapping the body in heavy blankets, weighting it with stones and throwing it in Lake Crescent, near Port Angeles, shortly before Christmas, 1937.

The body was recovered from the lake in June, 1940, and identity established recently through a six-tooth dental plate.
