

Stanford Faces Hard Test; Oregon To Battle Cougars

SAN FRANCISCO, Calif., Oct. 31.—(AP)—Far western football is becoming less muddled as it reaches the mid-season mark, and Stanford's high-flying Indians hope to unscramble it even more this week.

The Indians take on Santa Clara, leading independent, in the game that has been expected to decide 1941 coast supremacy since last season, when Stanford's Rose Bowlers barely got by the Broncos 7 to 6 in a clash of undefeated powerhouses.

The situation this week virtually duplicated last year's, and the Indians can once more establish themselves as the Pacific coast's top team by downing Santa Clara's great defensive outfit at Palo Alto Saturday. Both teams have been defeated once, but still have the best records in the west at this time. The Indians are heavily favored.

A new contender for conference honors, the University of California at Los Angeles, runs up against a tough University of California eleven in the ranking conference game Saturday at Los Angeles. The Bruins are a tie for second place with Oregon.

Washington State has another hard game against Oregon at Eugene. The Cougars have a fine passing attack built around Billy Sewell, and have been showing power on the ground, but Oregon is expected to return to form and the winner's circle.

The other two conference contests pit Washington against Montana at Seattle and Oregon State against Idaho at Corvallis. The games will not count in the conference standings, however, as Montana and Idaho do not play in the regular round-robin schedule. Washington and O. S. C. are expected to win handily.

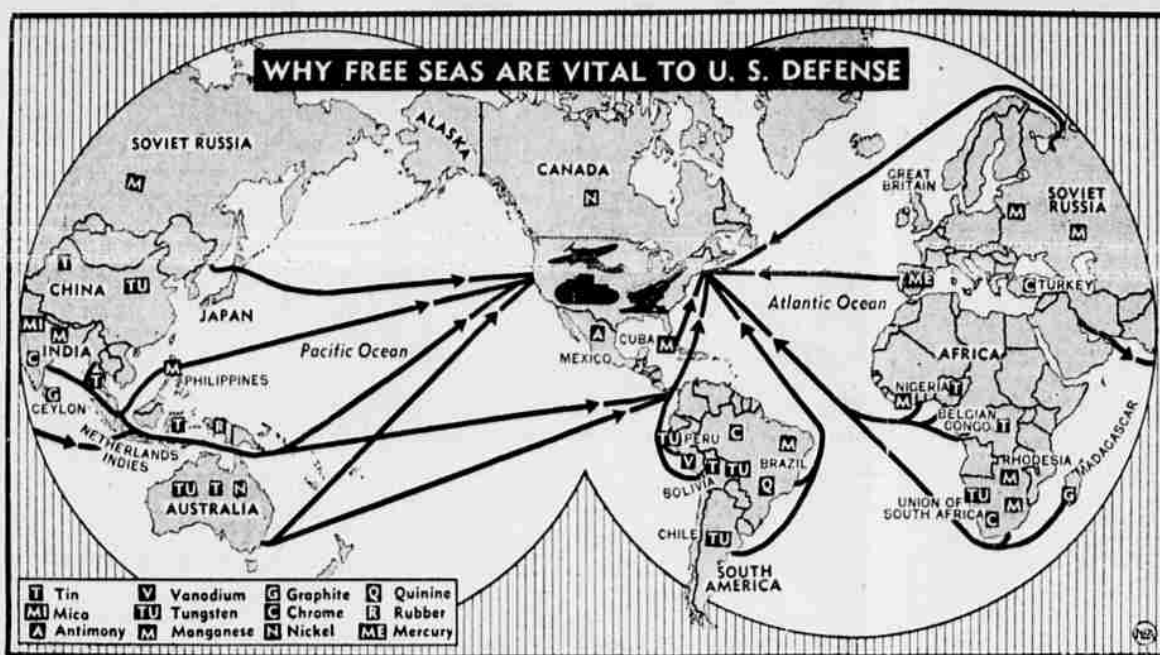

Nazi Lunge for Moscow Continues Stalemated

base west of Leningrad, had proved "stronger than veteran German airmen experienced in England or anywhere else" in combatting daylight raids.

Four hundred German planes have been destroyed in attacks upon Moscow in the past three months, said Russia's Tass news agency, and only 170 or 180 have gotten through the defenses.

Dienst disclosed that Leningrad, menaced since midsummer, still is not actually encircled by axis armies.

To the west and southwest of Moscow, Tass reported that soviet troops were not only holding their defense positions but improving them in some salients.

Crimea Situation Bad

On the southern (Ukraine) front, Adolf Hitler's high command asserted that the Russians were in full flight under the assault of German and Rumanian troops smashing into the Crimean peninsula.

Apparently heading for Russia's big Black sea naval base of Sevastopol, 100 miles across the Crimea, German flame-throwers, tanks and troops supported by strong aerial attacks, were reported to have broken through the Crimea's bottleneck gateway two days ago.

Soviet dispatches gave no hint of a precipitate retreat, declaring that Red army troops and marines were counterattacking fiercely, aided by planes of the Russian Black sea fleet.

Dispatches from Kuibyshev, auxiliary soviet capital, said all Crimean men capable of bearing arms were being mustered to stem the Nazi onslaught.

The Crimea is strategically important both as controlling the northern waters of the Black sea and as providing a short-cut route to the Caucasus oil fields across the narrow Kerch strait.

The Russians admitted gravity of the situation around Rostov-on-Don, but asserted that outnumbered soviet troops were fighting stubbornly and that one settlement had changed hands three times. London advances said the Germans were moving up heavy reinforcements for a concerted attack on that Don river port, gateway to the Caucasus.

Bad weather kept the RAF grounded last night, but while Germany thus was spared any attacks the German air force made some small sorties against scattered points in England.

Tokyo Still Talking "Peace"
Peace talk arose in Tokyo again today even as a reported German radio broadcast urging Japan to invade Australia touched off a storm of official reaction in Britain's far east dominion.

"Our determination to resist aggression is unequivocal and we are very well prepared. The fact is we are not acting alone," declared Australian Prime Minister Curtin.

Curtin declared the Nazi appeal, attributed to a Berlin naval spokesman, "Admiral Luet-zow," was a desperate attempt to gain an additional fighting ally.

The Japan Times and Advertiser, controlled by the Japanese foreign office, said the United States and Japan could start a snowball of peace rolling "by a display of strength through tolerance and concession."

Germany and Britain are committed to battle on, the newspaper said, and the United States, soviet Russia and China were unable to make overtures because they would be interpreted as weakness.

"Japan," it summed up, "is the only great power able to utilize any American readiness for peace by employing an initial United States peace policy to the best advantage everywhere in the wide world."

Thailand, an independent kingdom of 15,000,000 wedged between British far eastern possessions and Japanese-influenced French Indo-China, planned relatively heavy defense expenditures for 1942.

Military and naval appropriations exceeding \$41,000,000 are contained in her budgetary estimates just approved by the cabinet.

Sunday, November 2, the powerful army football team from Fort Ord, California, will play the University of Portland at Portland and details of the game will be aired by Shaw, beginning at 1:45 p. m. over KEX, Portland.
