CHRYSANTHEMUM SHOW TO BE HELD AT WOMAN'S CLUBHOUSE ON SATURDAY

Roseburg flower and garden growers have been showing increased interest in raising chrysanthemums during the last few years and so it was decided that the Roseburg Woman's club would sponsor the first chrysanthemum show here in years on Saturday, November 8th, at the clubhouse.

The exhibit will open at 10:30 a. m. and will close at 9:30 p. m. The exhibit will be open to all persons interested in raising chrysanthemums and all persons desiring to exhibit their flowers are privileged to do so without any charge.

There will be no admission charge for the affair, but a silver offering will be taken to defray the expenses of presenting the exhibit.

Several members of the Woman's club, who are working to raise money for the clubhouse fund, are planning to arrange bouquets of chrysanthemums for sale on Saturday and the proceeds taken in this manner, will be turned over to the club.

The purpose of sponsoring this exhibit is so that chrysanthemum growers can see what other chrysanthemum growers are raising and how they obtain the best results in the culture of the flowers. There will be persons present versed on the art of dis-budding the chrysanthemum plants and all types of information available will be on hand.

This exhibit for this year will be entirely informal, with all chrysanthemum growers in the city invited to attend and get acquainted with one another. There will be no prizes for exhibits, but persons desiring to take orders for plants may do so, but they are asked not to sell plants at the clubhouse on the day of the exhibit.

Men and boys, interested in growing chrysanthemums, are also asked to prepare tables to show their flowers. The purpose of the show is not only for persons who grow the chrysanthemums as they should be, but for all persons interested in this type of flowers and who are interested in improving their gardens for the coming year.

This exhibit will be the forerunner of an annual chrysanthemum show to be sponsored by

the Roseburg Women's club. The club is already making plans for the 1942 chrysanthemum show, at which time awards of merit will be given and a number of very interesting features will be presented.
