Motion pictures of actual air raids and combats at London, England, were shown before Oregon law enforcement officers at a meeting held in Portland by the Federal Bureau of Investigation Monday and Tuesday, Sheriff Cliff Thornton reported here today. The meeting was attended by Sheriff Thornton, Bill Mour, chief of police of Roseburg, and Harry McCabe, city marshal and deputy sheriff at Reedsport. The FBI, Sheriff Thornton said, called the school to give instructions to officers with regard to the civilian defense program. The officers were shown motion pictures of actual air raids, showing civilian reaction and right and wrong civilian conduct during the progress of raids. In addition the officers were given instructions with regard to combatting gas, handling of evacuation, transportation, etc. The local officers returned to Roseburg last night. Officer McCabe remained here today to appear as a witness before the county grand jury, which is in session this week.

Welders Asked to Go Back to Work Pending Parley
WASHINGTON, Nov. 5-(AP)-Associate Director Sidney Hillman of the OPM said today a committee representing striking west coast welders had agreed to ask the strikers to return to work immediately.
The number involved in the walk-out is estimated variously by the union at 20,000 and by the OPM labor division at 5,000. About 10,000 other workers have been made idle by the strike.
After all night negotiations, which broke up at 7 a. m. today, Hillman said Karl V. Morris, president of the United Welders, Cutters and Helpers of America, had been designated to call off the walk-out.
As soon as the men returned to work, Hillman added, the OPM would call a conference of the welders, OPM labor officials, and representatives of other labor organizations interested in the dispute in an effort to find a permanent solution of the welders' troubles.
He said all the strikers who returned immediately would be given their former jobs without discrimination, under protection of the OPM pending the outcome of the conference.
The welders involved were employed on important west coast shipbuilding projects. They left their jobs about three weeks ago demanding that the American Federation of Labor recognize them as a separate union. The stoppages spread and last night several Alabama defense industries were affected, OPM officials said.
