Victory Via U. S. Farms

WHEN a little red hen cackles nowadays, it's patriotic music no less important to U. S. defense than the clangor of a munitions factory.

Eggs and explosives are both key cogs in the defense machinery. Milk means as much as minesweepers, cheese and cannon are co-equal in importance.

Wickard goes further. He says food from U. S. farms will win the democracies' war, dictate the peace terms, and keep a permanent peace after the war.

It's the biggest job American farmers ever tackled. The food-for-defense program calls for the greatest farm production in U. S. history in 1942.

Three reasons are given for expanded food production. First, our own consumption is growing. Increased wages mean increased demand for better food.

Second, we have pledged ourselves to supply Britain with one-quarter of her needs in animal protein—meat, eggs, dairy products. To Britain, that's the difference between adequate rations and malnutrition.

Third and in the long run most important—we're building huge reserves or stockpiles of vitality-packed foods against the day when peace comes.

Quotas now are based on known requirements. Bureau of agriculture economics surveys show we're short of current and future needs in dairy products, eggs, pork, lard, vegetable oils and vegetables.

It means a sweeping change in established farm practices. It's no easier for a farmer to switch from all-grain growing to meat, egg and vegetable production than it is for a manufacturer of sewing machines to switch to machine guns.

The government protected the manufacturer by underwriting costs of his plant expansion and guaranteeing him a profitable market for his machine guns.

The government will support the prices of hogs, eggs, evaporated milk, dry skim milk and cheese at 85 per cent of parity at least until December 31, 1942.

At any rate, today's (Tuesday's) dispatches disclosed to us that the treasury is working (working hard, the dispatches say) on a plan for collecting income tax in advance from wage earners by making so much each week or month from their pay envelopes or salary checks.

IN practice, it will work something like this: At the beginning of the year, the employer will make a guess as to the net amount of taxes to be paid by each employee.

It will be merely a new application of installment plan buying with the employer paying the bookkeeping and collection cost.

A thought at this point: Many people who don't like to THINK are asking: "Why should the cost of living be going up as it is?"

The answer is that taxes become an unavoidable part of the cost of production and so must be paid in the long run by EVERYBODY who buys ANYTHING.
