A number of chrysanthemum growers exchange plants every year and in this way a large variety of the flowers can be grown in the many individual gardens of Roseburg. BOOMER HILL SCHOOL HAS HALLOWEEN SOCIAL

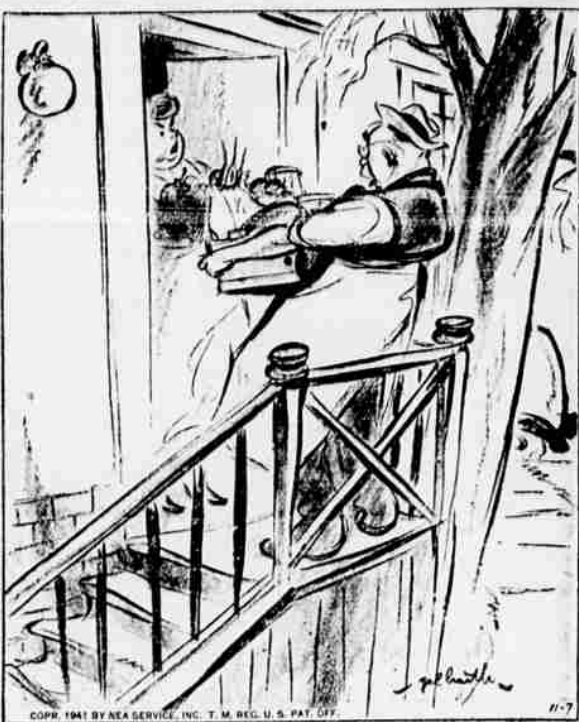
