

Regular Gather Of Junk Planned By Federal Govt.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 5.—(AP)—The government will shortly sponsor the continuous year-round collection of waste material from householders by regular junk and scrap dealers, and has abandoned salvage campaigns like the recent aluminum pots and pans drive.

Under the plan, housewives may sell waste paper, cotton and woolen rags, rubber articles, and toys and household appliances made of copper, lead, zinc, iron or steel. Lessing Rosenwald chief of the new bureau of industrial conservation, announced today.

Rosenwald and William S. Knudsen, director general of the Office of Production Management, also disclosed a new slogan for the defense program: "Work and save, help others fight, and fight yourself if you have to."

Rosenwald's bureau will guide the "save" part of the program. Knudsen told their joint press conference. The bureau was set up to direct and stimulate the salvage of defense-essential materials, and to conduct a broad program of substitution and conservation in industry and the simplification of designs and models of consumers' goods.

Rosenwald said that the OPM was far from satisfied with the handling of the "tea-kettles for battleships" aluminum drive conducted by the office of civilian defense, although public response

was excellent. Hereafter, he said, salvage efforts will be conducted through the channels of regular junk collectors and scrap dealers, with the government staying out of the picture.

Finns Score Nazis, But Ruler Ignores Warning

NEW YORK, Nov. 5.—(AP)—Twenty-one persons have been arrested in Helsinki as a result of strong anti-German demonstrations yesterday, the British Broadcasting corporation said today in a broadcast heard by NBC.

The BBC asserted that "angry crowds" denounced Germany, with whom Finland is fighting against Soviet Russia. Another broadcast by BBC, heard here by CBS, said Valno Tanner, socialist minister of trade, was asked at a stormy meeting of his party to quit the coalition Finnish government rather than accept any responsibility for continuance of the war on the side of Germany.

But Marshal Mannerheim, Finnish commander in chief, whom the BBC described as "Hitler's friend, virtually the ruler of Finland," was said to have rejected the American warning to make peace with Russia.

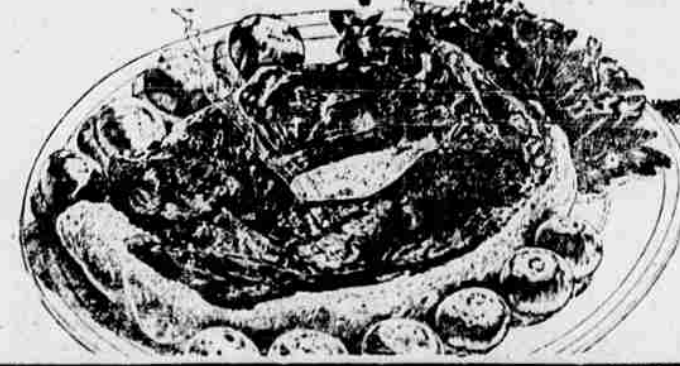
