for Japan the three-power axis alliance in Berlin a year ago when he was ambassador to Germany.

Today's dispatches add that he is not, however, among the most ardent supporters of the axis pact.

His coming is interesting chiefly as indicating Japan's desire to TALK SOME MORE before starting to shoot.

THERE are indications in the Japanese press today that what he will want to talk about

will include stopping American aid to China and putting an end to "enrichment" of Japan. Significant, perhaps, is an announcement by the Dutch East Indies today that exports of oil and gasoline to Portuguese colonies in the Pacific are being stopped...

THE British Broadcasting Corporation (government owned) and therefore subject to suspicion as propaganda tells today of "angry Finnish crowds denouncing Germany." It adds that 21 persons have been arrested in Helsinki as a result of such demonstrations.

Gaton Mannerheim, Finnish commander, described as Hitler's friend and virtual ruler of Finland, is said to have rejected the American warning to make peace with Russia.

ON the home front: A union JURISDICTIONAL dispute forces shutdown of work on gates at a navy dock in San Diego.

SUPPOSE Hitler were pounding at our gates, as he is at Russia's. Would he WAIT while the dispute was being settled? If he would, we have nothing to fear.

Fuel Control Duty Of Ickes Extended: WASHINGTON, Nov. 7. (AP) The designation by President Roosevelt of Secretary of the Interior Ickes as "solid fuels coordinator for national defense" was announced today by the White House.

Ickes for some time has been coordinator of petroleum and now will coordinate fuel problems of all types during the current emergency.

There was no exact definition of solid fuels, but evidently they would include coke, and, to a limited extent, wood, in addition to coal.

Mr. Roosevelt wrote Ickes that: "As the defense effort progresses it becomes increasingly urgent to assure that the supply of solid fuels will be adequate and that they will be readily available at consuming points when required for military, industrial and civilian purposes."

"Difficult problems are already arising with respect to their supply and availability for such uses."

"These problems require the efficient and carefully coordinated development, production, distribution, utilization, transportation and handling of solid fuels."

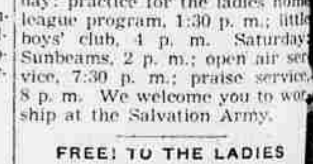
