## Syrian-Born Youth Dated in Roseburg For Success Talk



A Syrian-born youth who escaped the terror of his war-torn native land to win success in the new world, will be the speaker at Roseburg high school assembly Monday, Nov. 10, at 11:15 a. m. The assembly will be open to the public. One of the youngest lecturers in the country, Salom Rizk, above, has been acclaimed a "living example of the opportunities America offers." His address has been arranged through the cooperation of the editors of Reader's Digest, who are sponsoring his tour of high schools in the interests of good citizenship, and as a contribution to the vitally important job of character-building among America's youth.

Salom Rizk never knew his Syrian mother; she died the same day he was born. He never knew the meaning of the word "home." Foster mothers reared him.

Then came the "First World War." On every side he witnessed incredible scenes of terror and desolation; of burning, pillaging and murdering.

It was not until after all of this horror that Rizk learned about his absent father, actually a citizen of the United States. But the boy had no proof and the consul at Beirut sternly demanded his birth certificate. For five years Salom Rizk haunted the American consulate, a homeless waif, dreaming of the land of hope across the sea.

Finally he received his passport, and was permitted to sail to America; literally an emigrant to his own country.

Arriving here, Salom Rizk found that his struggles were not over. He couldn't speak a word of English; he knew nothing of

American customs; and he was penniless. But doggedly he resolved to make himself a self-supporting, good citizen. How he mastered an unfamiliar tongue; how he educated himself and achieved success under circumstances that many American boys would consider hopeless; and why his opinion is priceless in consideration of today's barbarian threat to democracy; these are a few of the inspiring stories that Salom Rizk will recount in his talk here.
