

Lone Victory of Season Sought By Grants Pass Team

Hard-Luck Cavemen Promise Tough Grid Tilt For RHS Indians Here Tuesday

Grants Pass Cavemen will be prepared to "shoot the works" in the annual Armistice day football game to be played here Tuesday afternoon on Finlay field, according to word from Grants Pass.

The game is expected to be the last of the season for the Cavemen, who today announced cancellation of the Thanksgiving day game scheduled with Corvallis high school. Grants Pass, so far without a victory, will be trying to place at least one win on the record book, and with no further games on the schedule will be in a position to devote every energy to winning Tuesday's contest from the Indians.

Injuries, sickness, loss of some players through naval recruiting and prospects of a financial loss in the Thanksgiving day game, led to cancellation of the game with Corvallis, according to the report received here.

It is the second game to be cancelled by Grants Pass this season, as the opener with Yreka was cancelled when the Jinx-ridden Cavemen had neither coach nor practice. In six games Grants Pass has tied one and lost five. The team, however, has shown scoring strength by being blanked only by Ashland and Marshfield, while scoring against Medford, Klamath Falls, Myrtle Point and North Bend.

Tough Struggle Expected.

The Roseburg Indians, trounced 33 to 7 by Cottage Grove in their last game, are expecting a tough struggle with the Cavemen, who use a powerful running attack. The Indians have been beaten twice this season by teams using the same style of play, and were fortunate to get a tie with University High after the Eugene team had discovered the Roseburg weakness and came from far behind to tie the score.

The Roseburg defensive line has been unable all year to halt power plays, except in the game played against Springfield high, which was the only contest of the season in which the linemen out-charged their opponents.

Coach Jim Davis has made several shifts in the lineup in an effort to strengthen line play, and is giving the local players hard workouts on defense.

Tuesday's game will be preceded by impressive exercises in connection with the dedication of an athletic field flagpole, being donated to the school by Umpqua post of the American Legion. The pole and flag will be presented by the post commander, with an accompaniment of band music and exercises by the Pop club. The presentation will start at 2 p. m. and will re-

Huskies, Bears To Clash in Top Tilt Of Week-End Bill

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 7.—(AP)—California's comeback for the Pacific coast conference football championship gets its field test tomorrow when the revitalized Golden Bears tangle with Washington at Berkeley.

Rolling again after an early-season slump, the Bears have fought to a position where they can oust pace-setting Stanford from the title by winning their last three games—Washington, Oregon State and Stanford.

That's a tough assignment, but Coach Allison's outfit was impressive in trampling Southern California and U. C. L. A. on successive week-ends, and the Bear coach thinks his team hasn't approached its peak yet.

California's real test will be the Washington Huskies, however, and a win tomorrow would make the Bears' chances for a shot at the Rose Bowl look promising.

The game is rated as a toss-up. The Huskies are hinting of a fancy new attack that will spring swift backs on long gainers, but California confidently expects to take them in stride. The Bears must stay in the conference title chase.

Indians to Battle Trojans.

Stanford's defending champions hook up with Southern California at Los Angeles in another league clash Saturday. The Indians crushed strong Santa Clara 27 to 7 last week, and figure to have no trouble with Impotent U. S. C., victorious in only two starts this season.

In two other conference encounters Saturday, U. C. L. A. runs up against Oregon State at Corvallis, and Idaho faces Washington State at Pullman.

The O. S. C. Beavers, one of the three teams still in the championship running, are favored over the Uclans. Washington State is expected to have an easy time with little Idaho.

In the only major Armistice day contest, University of Oregon and Santa Clara square off at Portland.

Sawdust Burner Trouble Explained

The use of sawdust burners too large for the furnace and too large to be heated by the most common cause of difficulty with these heating plants so popular in the Pacific northwest, reports Earl Willey, assistant professor of mechanical engineering here, in a new engineering experiment station bulletin entitled "Rating and Care of Domestic Sawdust Burners." This is the first piece of technical literature dealing with the domestic sawdust burner and is already in considerable demand from manufacturers, dealers, and users.

"Underheating is a rare thing with sawdust burners," concludes Professor Willey. "If it occurs it is generally caused by poor draft conditions in the chimney. The writer has yet to see a burner installed in a home that was too small for the house."

Oversized burners cause trouble when it is necessary to shut them down completely to control the heat of the house, Professor Willey explains. An auxiliary air intake is provided to keep the fire from being extinguished entirely. If the burner itself is of excessive size, this auxiliary air intake provides enough draft so that overheating may continue. If, on the other hand, this air intake is reduced the fire will smolder and unburned gas will accumulate in the combustion chamber, which is a potential source of the most dreaded backdraft and creosoting.

Professor Willey reports that domestic size sawdust burners are well adapted to automatic control and that as much as 25 percent of the fuel may be saved by this method as compared with manual controls. The bulletin discusses methods of rating sawdust burners, the comparative value of fuels, and various angles on the operation and care of domestic sawdust burners.
