placing guns on merchant ships. The broader senate measure, allowing armed ships to enter now-forbidden belligerent ports and combat areas, thus must be considered by the house.

House debate was set to start Wednesday, and although the rules in that chamber would permit the leadership to limit debate to an hour it was indicated that at least one or two full days' discussion would be granted.

LONDON, Nov. 8.—(AP)—"Armed United States ships may be here soon," the afternoon newspaper the Star said today in comment on the senate's vote to amend the neutrality act.

"The Evening Standard, one of Lord Beaverbrook's newspapers, said 'Roosevelt has his greatest victory.'"

Vote Limits Victory Size, Comment of Germany

BERLIN, Nov. 8.—(AP)—German spokesmen said today the United States Senate vote to arm merchant vessels "caused no surprise here" but added that "the narrow margin by which a majority was won does not look like a big victory."

Reports from London that a continental conference would be held soon at Vienna to announce a new order in Europe were termed nonsense by the spokesmen.

Hitler, they said, does not need multi-sided conferences. They added that the new order would be a matter of gradual growth.

Authorized sources said Britain already has written off Russia as lost and, at the proper time, would attempt to seize her ally's oil just as she tried to seize the French fleet.

They said the presence in the Near East of General Wavell, British commander in India, had the sole object of obtaining that oil.

remnants of the great Sevastopol naval base, and blasting Russian transports assembled off the Crimean coast for use as a possible "escape fleet" for red army troops.

The high command said Nazi and Rumanian forces had annihilated an entire Soviet cavalry division on the southern slope of the Yaila mountains, west of Kerch.

Winter Storms Arise

The daily German war bulletin was silent on operations around Rostov-on-Don, Moscow and Leningrad, and other reports indicated that winter storms were settling over the 1,200-mile front.

Various reasons for the static situation in Russia, among them strain on Adolf Hitler's hard-worked troops and stiffening red army resistance, were cited by London commentators but the severity of Russian winter apparently was the chief contributor.

On the front before Moscow, neither side seemed to achieve any clear-cut gain although the Germans hammered at the flanks of the Russian capital's defenses at Tula and Kalinin and the Russians pressed a strong counter-thrust in the Volokolamsk area, about 65 miles northwest of Moscow.

In London, parliamentary circles predicted a reply soon from prime minister Churchill to questions of British policy posed by agitation for a more determined war effort and by Russia's

mier Stalin's virtual appeal for a second front to help relax the pressure on Russia's hard-pressed armies.

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less an agreement is reached. It was understood the main difference was over the union's demand for a union shop clause providing all Weed plant employees would have to join the union within 30 days.

The strike extension threat was served on the company yesterday by Matt Pavolka, AFL district organizer.

Pavolka said any mills that accepted orders meant for the Weed plant of Long-Bell would be struck immediately. He set next Sunday as the date of a rally of AFL unionists at Klamath Falls, Ore., to decide further action.

Hearing Suggested

Mills that would be affected by an extension of the Weed walk-out are situated as far southward as Westwood and Susanville, Calif., and northward to Klamath Falls and Pine Ridge, Ore.

The only possibility of an immediate peaceful settlement appeared to lie in a proposal by Federal Labor Conciliator Andrew J. Gallagher for the appointment of a three-man board to conduct a hearing at which both sides would present their differences.

In addition to asking for a union shop clause, the union sought an increase in wage minimums of sixty to seventy cents an hour, an eight hour day, a one-week annual paid vacation, and better housing.

Teamsters Place Yakima Apples on Unfair List

SEATTLE, Nov. 8.—(AP)—Yakima apples were placed on the national unfair list of the AFL teamsters union here last night.

Dave Beck, western leader of the union, declared that teamsters had already stopped the flow of Yakima apples to the Seattle market and had notified locals all over the country not to handle the Yakima product at fruit markets or brokers, to buy them or even to eat apple pie in restaurants which used them.

The action was taken, Beck said, to back up demands for a closed shop by a teamsters union affiliate in Yakima valley packing houses. Strike votes have been taken against several plants.

Joseph Cheney, Yakima attorney and spokesman for the packers, said the teamsters affiliate had failed to prove its members were a majority of the packing house workers. The union, he added, had declined to negotiate wages, hours or working conditions except on a closed shop basis.

Japanese Envoy on Peace Mission Not Optimistic

MANILA, Nov. 8.—(AP)—Saburo Kurosu, special Japanese envoy flying to the United States in an attempt to bring about a settlement with Washington, was reliably reported today to have told friends here that he did not have "much hope" for success.

Kurosu, who stopped here overnight, was reported to have said yesterday that he felt he was unable to offer the United States sufficient concessions to break the stalemate in rapprochement negotiations.

TOKYO, Nov. 8.—(AP)—Contemplated withdrawal of American Marines from Shanghai means the United States is preparing everything for the worst possible outcome of the Japanese-American conferences in Washington, the newspaper Asahi declared tonight.

Air Filter Service Still Seeking Women for Duty

Applications still are being accepted at the office of the Roseburg chamber of commerce for women willing to give volunteer service at the air raid warning service filter center. A number of registrations already have been received, but more are needed, it was reported by Harry Pinniger, defense coordinator.

It is anticipated there will be additional registrations Monday, when a new training class is to be organized.

An effort is being made to recruit approximately 80 more women for this service to bring the trained personnel to 160 or more. Women enrolling for the service will be required to give only a few hours of time each month for training, but must be in readiness at all times for longer service in the event of actual emergency.

Ex-Convict Arrested Here On Order of Parole Board

Acting upon instructions from the state parole board, Sheriff Cliff Thornton today arrested Edward A. Larson of Chicago, following release from the veterans hospital here. Larson was sent to the state penitentiary from Douglas county March 10, 1928, for a maximum term of 15 years, following conviction on morals charges. He was released from the penitentiary on parole, March 10, 1933. Sheriff Thornton said he was advised that Larson recently became involved in trouble in Portland and was given a sanity examination and committed to the veterans hospital here, but was ordered discharged following a brief stay. The parole board, in the instructions sent to the sheriff, ordered that he be taken into custody and returned to the penitentiary.

Almon Gartin Stricken by Death at Camas Valley

Almon Gartin, 59, a resident of Camas Valley, died suddenly yesterday from heart failure. Coroner H. C. Stearns and Deputy Sheriff O. T. Carter were called yesterday to the Amos Kouns home, where Gartin had been residing, by a report that he had died suddenly. Examination, it was reported, showed that the man had been troubled by a heart ailment for several years and that death was due to natural causes. The body is being removed to Eugene, where a brother resides, by the Stearns mortuary, Oakland.
